WEATHER FORECAST

Furnished Expressly for The Chief for Webster, Conn.

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St. Joseph, Mo., March 23.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 24th to 28th, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 29th, cross the western mountains by close of 30th, the great central valleys from 31st to April 2d, and the eastern states about the 3d. This will be a severe storm, and its course should be carefully watched as it crosses the continent. It will probably be at its greatest force in the eastern states and eastern Canada about April 3d or 4th, and at the same time the cool wave will be at its greatest force in middle Canada and the great central valleys.

The second storm wave of April will reach the Pacific coast about April 3d, cross the western mountains by close of the 4th, the great central valleys from 2d to 7th, and the eastern states about the 8th. This will also be a severe storm, at its greatest force in and west of the great central valleys.

The latter part of March and the first half of April will be so crowded with weather disturbances that the regular storm waves will become somewhat irregular, fair weather days will be few and far between, and severe storms may strike on any day.

The warm waves will cross the western mountains about March 29th and April 3d, the great central valleys 3d and 4th, and the eastern states about April 2d and 7th.

The cool waves will cross the western mountains about April 1st and 6th, the great central valleys about 3d and 8th, and the eastern states about 5th and 10th.

For April the whole temperature of the United States will average above, while at a few locations the temperature will be normal or below. This will bring what is called an early spring in the extreme northern states and Canada. The cold February brought a late spring in the south just as predicted in these bulletins. Farm work will probably be retarded by rains during the first part of April, east of the Missouri and near and east of the lower Mississippi.

EARTHQUAKES AND COMETS. Prof. Falb of Vienna, Austria, is said to be a specialist of high repute. He is becoming world renowned for his correct forecasts of great earthquakes, and as weather events and earthquakes are believed to be from the same cause, Prof. Falb's forecasts of the latter will be of interest to readers of these bulletins.

Sometime ago he published predictions that earthquakes of more than ordinary force would occur during 1894, about Jan. 21, Feb. 20, March 21, April 6, May 5, August 1 and 24, Sept. 29 and Oct. 28. These are also my dates for severe storms on this continent, and as his forecasts and my calculations were made without any knowledge of each other it indicates that we are studying along the same lines as to the moon's influence on the earth.

According to Prof. Falb's estimate the greatest of these earthquake disturbances is to occur near August 20th, the next in force near September 20th, then Feb. 20th, March 21, April 1, etc. This is in accord with my estimate of weather events. The storms about Feb. 20 were among the most severe of the winter, and the others are expected to develop force in accord with Prof. Falb's estimates of earthquakes for the same dates.

He stops, however, at the points where the moon is near the earth, while weather calculations include many other positions of the moon and many more of the sun and planets. Electricity is the force that causes these seismic and atmospheric disturbances, and when that force is rightly understood, we may know, approximately, when to expect important weather events and earth disturbances.

Prof. Falb makes another important prediction. He says the great comet that visited our solar system in 1861 will return in 1894 and probably collide with our earth. No doubt such collisions have occurred and may occur again. All astronomers admit these to be indisputable facts.

A metropolitan daily paper of the eastern states says: "Prof. Falb has a reputation all over Europe for his meteorological knowledge, and particularly for his extraordinary familiarity with the habits and customs of earthquakes. His predictions of seismic disturbances have been remarkably fulfilled."

These facts make his prediction about the comet of more than ordinary interest, and the unwelcome visitor may come uncomfortably near our earth, but there are many chances that no serious damage may be expected.

Astronomical calculations have advanced to most wonderful perfection, and astronomers can surely give almost the exact position of a comet at any moment. The comet of 1866 will no doubt cross the earth's path in 1893, but as our earth moves about 66,000 miles an hour, an error of one hour in the calculations would prevent a collision, and then probably nothing more serious could occur than the saturation of our atmosphere with poisonous gases from the comet, and a large increase of configurations, caused by an increase of electric activity.

THE STORM PERIOD. The week ending March 11th inaugurated the five weeks predicted period of severe storms and the reports are all in. Three tornadoes occurred during that week, one in Colorado, one in Texas and one in Missouri, two of which were accompanied by severe hail storms. The center of the 7th to 11th storm wave entered the Pacific coast on the morning of the 6th, at which time the whole continent was covered by a low from which the tornadoes developed. On 9th the wind reached the high velocity of 44 miles at Salt Lake, and on 10th 40 miles at Davenport, Iowa, with the barometer down to 29.38. On 11th the wind was 44 miles in eastern Canada. More than three inches of rain fell in parts of the country within twenty-four hours. The National weather bureau at Washington denominated this series of storms as "severe and moving with great velocity." The results are sufficient to verify the predictions for the inaugural week.

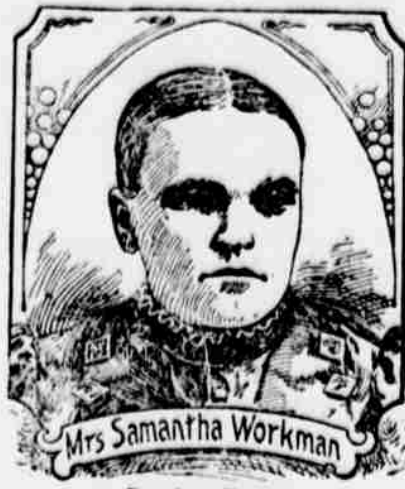
