



### WOMEN IN BUSINESS.

THEY ARE TAKING UP MANY MASCU-LINE AVOCATIONS.

Large Connecreial Enterprises Successfully Managed by the Gentler Sex-They Are Also Engaged at Callings Which Require Skill and Physical Endurance.

Women are found today in many an employment which until very recently was regarded as the exclusive privilege of man. For instance, one of the most successful ranch owners in Kansas is not a robust and ablebodied man, but a woman fair of face, petite in form and not more than 30 years old. Advertising is another business in which women are beginning to figure prominently. There are two very large advertising agencies in Boston, the members of both firms being women and all their employees women. They make their contracts and attend to the most intricate business problems themselves and have large contracts for entire railroads and street cars in the largest cities in the United States.

One woman in this city who had an xcellent musical education in her youth took a thorough and systematic course in the theoretical study and practice of piano tuning and soon proved her capacity in excelling the male competitors in the establishment. She has now a very large number of patrons and comfortably supports herself and two children. The first woman railroad president in this country succeeded her hus-band on his death. He was the presi-dent of the Pennsboro and Harrisville

The First National bank of Lexing ton, Neb., has for its president Mrs. H. R. Temple and for vice president Miss Temple. The recent election of the wife of a senior member of a large New York firm of short line railway builders as president of the Hains Medina Valley Railroad company in Texas makes the second instance in this country of a woman appointed to fill this position. There is only one woman railroad engineer. There is a little stretch of road known as the Cairo Short Line, and on this the daughter of one of its chief owners rode to school daily, and at a very early age seemed deeply interested in machinery and always had the workings of the engine explained. Finally she manifested a greater interest in mechanical and railroad engineering, and as all things come to him (or her) who waits a chance arrived. The engineer of this narrow gauge road became ill, and during this illness the young woman in question took his place and made the runs without any mishap. Upon the death of the engineer she assumed charge of the train, which she is still running, to the entire satisfaction of all parties

concerned. In Texas there is a female contractor in the employ of the United States government. Her contract is for carrying the mail from Keith to White Hall. Georgia has a woman mail carrier who not only delivers the mail on her little black pony over a 40 mile route triweekly in a bleak and sparsely settled region, but manages a large farm. as well, dodister by her indefatigable industry and

energy. She is but 23 years old. In Cincinnati an excellent restaurant is in the Chamber of Commerce building and is patronized exclusively by the foremost business men in that city. It is run by three Scotchwomen and upon strictly temperance principles. Every one predicted their failure when it was announced that positively no liquor was procurable in their restaurant, and people scoffed to think they could not even get a glass of beer with their meals, but their predictions proved erroneous, for besides paying an annual rental of \$5,-000 for their magnificent premises they

clear annually from \$10,000 to \$15,000. The lady guide is an institution in Lendon and an innovation now being introduced in American cities. In London these guides are for the express purpose of supplying women tourists with members of their own sex to pilot them safely over the well known tours of England and the British islands in general and in fact anywhere they wish to go on the continent. These guides are re-fined and cultivated, speak French and German fluently, else their application for this rather agreeable position will not be considered, and have excellent credentials as to character and sobriety. They are supposed to work eight hours a day, and their charge is but 10 shillings—equivalent to \$2.50 of American money. When one considers the aggravations one is spared by having a guide, and the surety one feels of not having spent too much for anything purchased it will be found that this amiable courier has saved her employer fully the

amount of her salary. In New Orleans one of the finest orchestras is composed entirely of women, and the leader and her corps of well trained musicians are seen at every cutertainment of note in that gay city. In Astoria, N. Y., many of the largest hothouses are controlled and managed by women. In Gotham is a blacksmith's shop managed entirely by the three daughters of the blacksmith, who are intelligent young women. The father died some 12 years ago, and the mother took charge of the establishment, and looking to the future she had her girls instructed not only in the art of horseshoeing, but in everything pertaining to the trade. Since the mother's death one of the sisters married, and now the married sister and the two young girls employ five men, but personally superintend every horse that is shod. Among their patrons are numbered the wealthiest owners of horses in this city -New York Tribune

WORK OF NATIONAL LAWMAKERS. Pasture for Town Herd and Iowa Congressman Finally Gets the House to Take Action on Pension Bills.

WASHINGTON, April 25.-The senate presented an appearance of calm after the storm Wednesday. The galleries were only half filled, while the Democatic senators gave evidence of relief that the first step in the tariff debate was concluded, coupled with a determination to carry on the work. Other bills were introduced and appropriately referred,

Mr. Allen (Neb.) offered a resolution that the Coxeyites be allowed the right of peaceably assembling in Washington' and petitioning the government for a redress of their grievances. It went over under the rules.

Washington, April 25.—Mr. Hepburn ila.), after the reading of the journal in the house Wednesday, interposed an objection to its approval and forced the yeas and nays on Mr. Dockery's motion for its approval. Mr. Hepburn adhered to his determination to allow absolutely no business to be transacted by unanimous consent until terms were made for the consideration of Friday night pension bills. The journal was approved-248 to 9. The house then went into the com-

mittee of the whole, Mr. Bailey (Tex.) in the chair, and resumed the consideration of the diplomatic and consular appropri-ation bill, which occupied the time until 5:10, when the house adjourned. Washington, April 26.—Immediately

after the reading of the journal in the senate Thursday, Mr. Jarvis, recently ap-pointed from North Carolina to succeed the late Senator Vance, was sworn in. Senator Allen's Coxey resolution came up. Mr. Wolcott (Colo.) entered a vigorous protest against passing the resolu-

tion. He said it was to be regretted the governors of certain states had been so unwise as to urge these men to make a descent on the capitol of the United States. His own state of Colorado had the misfortune to have one of these governors, whose antics had brought dis-credit and dishonor to the commonwealth and sullied her fair name. He believed most of the men in Coxey's army might be honest, but they were led by men who were cranks, insane or vicious.

At 1:45 o'clock, before any action had been taken on the resolution, Mr. Harris moved to take up a resolution providing that "tomorrow and until otherwise or-dered the senate shall meet at 11 o'clock

Senators Peffer and Allen objected to the pending resolution being displaced and demanded a yea and nay vote. The vote (which also showed the attitude of the senate on Mr. Allen's resolution) was

as follows: Yeas, 54; nays, 6.

WASHINGTON, April 26. — Hepbura
(Ia.) interposed his daily objection to the approval of the journal in the house Thursday and compelled a roll call, which resulted in its approval—287 to 0. Debate proceeded in a desultory manner on small, unimportant amendments to the appropriation bill, none of which were adopted. When the bill was completed,

the committee rose.

Washington, April 27.—The campaign

No general business was transacted in the senate, Mr. Harris moving, as soon as the session began, that the tariff bill be taken up. There was some resistance to this plan, particularly by Mr. Dubois, but the motion passed, 29 to 16. Mr. Dolph waived his right to the floor and Mr. Lindsay addressed the senate.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The opening of the senate proceedings today was a repetition of that of yesterday. Before the reading of the journal of yesterday, Mr. Frye remarked sarcastically that such an important document should not be read in the absence of the senator from Tennessee (Mr. Harris) and of a quorum. The roll was called and at 11:07 a quorum appeared and the reading of the journal was completed. The house joint resolution authorizing the secretary of the treasury to make partial payments on vessels constructed and repaired under the control of the treasury department to the extent of 75 per cent of

the value of the work done was passed. WASHINGTON, April 30.—The time of the senate was occupied today in spicy colloquies between Messrs, Hale, Teller and Aldrich on one side, and Harris and Voorhees on the other, upon the question why no better progress is being made with the tariff bill.

Mr. Turpie, who got the floor when Columbia River Red Salmon,

Mr. Palmer sat down, made a direct assault on Mr. Aldrich, the like of which has not been heard in the senate chamber for years. 
