

THOUSANDS IN PERIL.

RELIEF CAME TO MANY ANXIOUS HEARTS AT WILLIAMSPORT.

The Worst Has Come and Gone—Susquehanna Has Made a New High Water Record—Million and a Half of Property Destroyed—Big Loss at Johnstown.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa., May 22.—As night approached Monday and darkness settled down, the terrors of the flood increased. The yellow torrent rushing down from the hill sides, fed by a thousand mountain streams, and growing with each passing minute, assumed new terrors, and the stricken people looked forward with dread to the ordeal through which they must pass before morning.

The flood reached its maximum at 7 o'clock, when it was 35 feet above low water mark on the river register and was eight feet deep on the pavement of the courthouse in the center of the city. For an hour the water hung at that point and then to the immense relief of thousands of anxious hearts, it began slowly to recede.

At 9 o'clock it had fallen a foot and is still going down, slowly, to be sure, but surely enough to lift a terrible load from a multitude of hearts. All now feel that the worst has come and gone. The river has made a new record—35 feet above low water. A million and a half in property has been destroyed, but so far as can be learned no lives have been lost. To give the losses in detail is impossible. It cannot even be approximated.

Bridges Carried Out. OLEAN, N. Y., May 22.—A large number of houses were swept away during Monday night. Lumber was carried away in piles. The bridges of the Western road were carried out and all stores and the Postal Telegraph office are under water. The water has driven scores of people from their homes and ruined their household goods. No lives are reported lost, but crops in the valley are ruined.

Big Loss of Property. JOHNSTOWN, Pa., May 22.—The damage by the flood in Johnstown is estimated at about \$125,000. The damage along the line of the Pennsylvania road between Johnstown and Altoona is placed at \$250,000.

FIERCE STORM AT MILWAUKEE.

Six Lives Lost and the Schooners Cummings and Barnes Wrecked.

MILWAUKEE, May 20.—Hanging to the rigging of the schooner M. J. Cummings, just south of Milwaukee light house Friday night were the bodies of a woman and a man, the former a stewardess and the latter a sailor. Four others, including the captain, have been drowned, and one, Robert Patterson, a sailor is saved. It was the fiercest storm that has swept the west shore of the Michigan since the crib disaster two years ago when eleven lives were lost. The Cummings and the schooner C. C. Barnes tried to enter the harbor early in the day and failed to make the pier and were soon drifting toward the beach on Jones Island. An unsuccessful effort was made by the life saving crew to rescue all the crew of the Cummings, but they were nearly drowned in the attempt, the lifeboat being overturned, the crew escaping almost miraculously. The crew of the Barnes escaped and the vessel can be released as she is light and on a sandy bottom.

Wrecks at Chicago.

CHICAGO, May 20.—The storm which swept Lake Michigan Friday was the most disastrous of recent years. Eight vessels were driven ashore within the city limits of Chicago, and out of their crews 10 men are known to be drowned, and in every instance boat and crew are utterly lost. One schooner, the Myrtle, was wrecked just outside the pier, within a half a mile of Michigan boulevard, and six men of her crew went down to death in plain view of the hundreds of people who lined the boulevard walks or watched the awful storm from the windows of the big hotels which overlook the harbor. The wrecks extended from Glencoe on the north, where the Lincoln Hall went to pieces, to South Chicago, an air line distance of 40 miles.

The Fatalities are:

ANTON GUNTERS of Manitowish, seaman, Schooner Hall, drowned while attempting to reach shore. CHARLES GAUTHIER, cook on schooner Jack Thompson, rescued in Chicago, washed from a rope while attempting to reach shore. JOSEPH SYLON of Sturgeon Bay, mate of the J. Leonis McClarin, struck and killed by the tow post torn out when the vessel broke away from tug. Entire crew of Schooner Myrtle, six men. THOMAS KELSO, fisherman, washed off the government pier and drowned.

Verdict of the Jury in the Dr. Meyer Case.

NEW YORK, May 19.—The jury in the case of Dr. Henry C. F. Meyer, who is charged with poisoning Ludwig Brandt, returned a verdict of murder in the second degree. The penalty is imprisonment for life.

HELENA, Mont., May 21.—Cozyites have captured two Northern Pacific trains—one in Montana and one in the Cour d'Alene region.

FREE COINAGE OR REVOLUTION.

President Fiske Talks Strongly to the Bimetallic League.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—President A. C. Fiske of Denver called the Pan-American Bimetallic league to order in the Grand Army hall today, when about 75 delegates were present. In his opening address Mr. Fiske said the legislation of the last 30 years in this country had been in the interest of foreign nations. He attributed the present situation in business to the demonetization of silver and believed a revolution would come if relief were not granted in the line of free coinage.

At the conclusion of Mr. Fiske's speech General Stephen M. Field of Virginia was chosen chairman of the convention. G. M. Libbles of Nebraska was chosen secretary. The remainder of the morning session was devoted to speaking. Among those who talked were Representatives Hudson of Kansas and Pence and Bell of Colorado.

At the afternoon session a petition signed by about 600 citizens of Denver, asking that steps be taken to bring about the restoration of silver to its former position as a money metal, was received and ordered transmitted to the house of representatives.

THE WEEKLY CROP REPORT.

Past Week Has Been One of Unusual Temperature Extremes.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The weather bureau, in its report of weather crop conditions for the past week, says: The week has been one of unusual temperature extremes, the differences between the highest and lowest temperature amounting to as much as 60 degrees in the upper Missouri valley and ranging from 40 to 60 degrees over the greater portion of the country east of the Rocky mountains. In Kentucky and northern Florida the temperature reached the lowest point that has been recorded in May since the establishment of the weather bureau. The rainfall was very heavy in eastern Montana and generally above the average over Idaho, eastern Oregon and Washington and central California. There was a total absence of rain in Kansas, southwestern Missouri, Oklahoma, western Texas and over the greater part of Arkansas. Drouth prevails in eastern South Dakota, Nebraska, Arkansas, southwestern Texas and New Mexico.

PRESBYTERIAN SEMINARY QUESTION.

Settled as Far as the General Assembly Is Concerned.

SARATOGA, N. Y., May 23.—The question of theological seminary control, so far as the Presbyterian church is concerned is settled. By a vote of almost 4 to 1, the report of the majority of the committee that considered the matter was adopted. It provides for gaining the power and right to approve the appointments of professors and directors and asks the directors of the seminaries to declare a trust in favor of the Presbyterian church, which the general assembly may enforce in the civil courts. At the same time a committee is provided, which shall confer and advise with the seminaries and seek to gain their consent to the proposed plan.

FRENCH CABINET RESIGNS.

Government Defeated in the Chamber by a Majority of Fifty.

PARIS, May 23.—The government was defeated Tuesday in the chamber of deputies on the question as to whether the minister of public works had the authority to allow the employes of the state railroads to attend the congress of railroad men. The premier, M. Casimir-Perier, demanded the adoption of the order of the day pure and simple. The premier's motion was rejected by a vote of 275 to 235. M. Casimir-Perier thereupon left the Palais Bourbon and the ministers subsequently proceeded to the Lysee palace and handed in their resignations to President Carnot.

SENATE BRIBERY INVESTIGATION.

Senators Hunton and Kyle Both Testify They Were Offered a Bribe.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The senatorial committee to investigate allegations that attempts have been made to corrupt Senators Hunton and Kyle held a brief session today. Senator Hunton and his son testified and the correspondence between them on the subject was laid before the committee. C. W. Buttz made application to be present at the meeting of the committee but no answer has yet been returned. Senator Kyle told the committee that about two months ago he was approached by Buttz with a proposition to pay him \$214,000 for his vote.

Six Spanish Reds Shot.

BARCELONA, May 22.—The six anarchists, Colina, Corezuela, Sogas, Bernat, Villarubia and Mir, sentenced to death after having been convicted of complicity in the attempt of Pallas to assassinate Captain General Martinez Campos, and of being concerned in the Liceo theater bomb outrage, were executed at 4 a. m. outside the citadel of Mont Juich.

CHICAGO, May 22.—Wheat resumed its temporarily interrupted toboggan slide today and landed 1/2c lower. Disappointing cables, heavy Baltic shipments, small exports, few selling and warmer weather all contributed to the weakness. Corn closed 1/2c lower, oats 1/4c higher and provisions slightly lower.
