OMAHA, May 21.—A killing frost in Sarpy county cut all vegetation to the ground.

Cut Wires on the Union Pacific.
ROGERS, Neb., May 22.—Some miscreants cut the wire at several places on the Union Pacific fence here.

Hays Will Orate at Alnsworth.
NORFOLK, May 22.—Hon. John R. Hays has been selected to deliver the Fourth of July oration at Alnsworth.

Populist State Convention.
LINCOLN, Neb., May 21.—The Populist executive committee called the state convention to meet at Grand Island, Aug. 18.

Nebraska National Guards Inspected.
MILFORD, Neb., May 22.—Adjutant General Gage and Inspector General Hotchkiss inspected troop A of the Nebraska National Guards.

Cambridge Attorney Under Arrest.

Fire in a Columbus Hotel.
COLUMBUS, Neb., May 21.—Fire from a defective fuse caused about \$2,500 damage to the Grand Pacific hotel. The landlord, Mr. L. M. Mahood, loses about \$500. Fully insured.

Youthful Suicide at Wayne.
WAYNE, Neb., May 19.—Sheridan Sines, the youngest son of R. G. Sines, aged about 18 years, committed suicide by hanging himself at his father's residence, near Winnsie.

Shot the Girl He Loved.
OMAHA, May 21.—J. C. Shearer, a lumber merchant from Allegheny City, Pa., shot his affianced, Miss Aurora McClintock, and then himself at the Hotel Dellone. Neither has yet died.

Lincoln Daily Call Sold.
LINCOLN, Neb., May 22.—The Lincoln Daily Call has been sold by its former owners, Bushell & Cox, and will be turned over to the new proprietors, Professor Austin and W. Morton Smith, on June 1.

Ross Was a Seward Printer.
SEWARD, Neb., May 22.—George Ross, who shot and killed the deputy postmaster of Cottonwood Falls, Kan., and was afterward hung to a bridge by a mob, worked at one time on The Blade of Seward.

Decision in the Corbett Case.
NEBRASKA CITY, May 19.—Father M. J. Corbett is in the city and received the news from Plattsmouth regarding Judge Chapman's decision that the injunction must stand until the case comes up for trial early in June.

Short Several Thousands.
BROKEN BOW, Neb., May 19.—J. A. Preston, local agent for the Globe Investment company, left here on May 7 and has not been heard of since. Upon investigation it is thought he is short from \$2,000 to \$7,000.

Irrigation Ditch Washout.
GERING, Neb., May 18.—The headgate of the Mitchell canal, one of the largest on the North Platte river, has been washed out by high water. Dikes are broken at various places along the canal and the country is flooded.

Continued to the Next Term.
GRAND ISLAND, Neb., May 22.—The two criminal cases on the district court docket against Edward Hackenberger, defaulting county treasurer and secretary of the board of education, were continued to the next term.

Talmage Failure.
NEBRASKA CITY, Neb., May 19.—Judge Jesse S. Mapes of Syracuse was appointed permanent receiver of the affairs of Becker & Tangemon of Talmage and qualified by filing a bond for \$15,000. He takes possession at once.

Picked up a Mammoth's Tooth.
M'COOL JUNCTION, Neb., May 22.—A mammoth tooth in good state of preservation, weighing about nine pounds, was found by workmen in a land pit on the Org farm near here. C. C. Norquist of this place owns the tooth.

Republicans Will Meet at Omaha.
OMAHA, May 24.—The Republican state committee met here and decided to call the state convention to be held in Omaha on Aug. 23, one week later than the meeting of the Populists at Kearney. Lincoln was Omaha's only competitor.

Girl Implicated in Horse Stealing.
BEATRICE, Neb., May 21.—Ida Clark, arrested at Denver some days ago and brought to this city on a charge of being implicated in a case of horse stealing at Wymore, was released on her own recognizance to appear at the October term of the district court.

Seized an Illicit Still.

natural quantity of electricity, when the pith balls lie on the plate again. In dealing with the heavenly bodies our scientists entirely neglect the electrospheres that must necessarily surround all of them and these electrospheres being of great extent, constitute the repelling force that prevents these bodies from falling together, or in other words, cause them to float in each other's electrospheres.

These facts being admitted, we have very simple, easily understood laws by which these bodies revolve around each other.

Electricity moves in a spiral, its path being in the form of a cork-screw, and therefore as it passes through the sun, a planet or a satellite they are thus, by the winding force of the electrical current, caused to rotate.

Taking the sun as the starting point, its electrosphere of course turns with it, carrying all the planets around in the same direction in which the sun rotates. The sun being the moving force as to the elements that surround it, those elements move slower as we recede from the sun, and therefore we find the outer planets moving slower than the inner ones.

If the elements surrounding the sun revolved as rapidly as the surface of the sun does, they would move 113 miles a second at Mercury, but as they do not, Mercury moves about 29 miles a second, Venus 21 miles, the earth 18, Mars 15, Jupiter 8, Saturn 6, Uranus 4, and Neptune 3.

No other reason than given above can be assigned why Mercury moves ten times as fast as Neptune, and every theory breaks down except the one that supposes an element surrounding and rotating with the sun, in which all the planets float, and a like element surrounding the earth and planets in which their moons float.

Remember that in reference to each other the earth and planets have no weight. The matter composing them presses equally from all directions toward their own centers, leaving them absolutely without weight or gravitation toward each other except the push of ether that comes from limitless space, and on which these heavenly bodies feed and grow. Therefore very little buoyancy is required of their surrounding elements in order that they may float in each other's electrospheres.

Probably an ordinary clothes line would be sufficient by which to pull our earth out of its course if the pull was at right angles to its path.

To Water Consumers.

Notice is hereby given to the patrons of the city water service, of the city of Red Cloud, that section 24 of ordinance No. 43 heretofore annexed of said city will be strictly enforced hereafter:

It shall be unlawful for any person within said city to sprinkle, eject or throw water from private or public sprinkler, washer or hydrant upon any public street, lane or alley, or any garden or enclosure, or permit or cause the same to be done, nor upon or against any building upon such street, lane or alley, except for the extinguishment of fires and ordinary house cleaning except between the hours of 6 and 7 o'clock a. m., and 5 and 8 o'clock p. m., of each day; and any other person violating any of the provisions of this section shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars and stand committed until such costs and fine are paid.
