WEATHER BULLETIN

PROGNOSTICATIONS OF WEATHER.

Prepared and Furnished for Special Publication in the Red Cloud Chief by W. T. Foster.

St. JOSEPH, Mo, June 8th.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from June 14th to 17th and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 18th, cross the western mountains by close of the 19th and the great central valleys from 20th to 22d, and the eastern states about the 23d.

The week promises to average cooler than the general average temperature for June. This has reference to the whole country and only indicates that places of low temperature will exceed those of a high temperature. Rainfall will occur in spots above the average from the 95th meridian eastward.

The warm wave will cross the western mountains about the 18th, the great central valleys about the 20th and the eastern states about the 22d. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about the 21st the great central valleys about the 23d and the eastern states about the 25th.

ELECTROLYSES.

This term is used in connection with electro-plating, but herein it is used in connection with the weather. Before we can have rain the water must be electrolysed, or in more common sense terms, evaporated.

A standard authority says: "Solids which conduct electricity undergo no chemical change. Non-metallic liquids always undergo decomposition. Perfectly pure water is difficult to electrolyse and may be ranked with non-conductors, but sulphuric acid diluted with twenty or thirty thousand times its own volume of water conducts freely, and is therefore decomposed abundantly. The visible products of the electrolyses of such a mixture are the elements of hydrogen and oxygen, two volumes hydrogen to one of oxygen. If the electrodes are very small and the current strong the whole of the strength is concentrated on a small space and the result is that the tension is so increased that both water and salt are decomposed together."

The above authoritative statements are important in that they prove that evaporation of water takes place more readily from sea water than from fresh water lakes, and also more readily from mineral lands than those that are free from mineral mixtures.

The soils of the countries lying within 200 or 300 miles east of the Rocky mountains contain a large portion of mineral mixtures, and therefore the moisture of those soils is more readily evaporated.

Discussing a kindred subject, A. W. Sparks writes:

"Those extreme drouths of western Texas are the result of chemical action of certain mineral substances in the earth, causing a constant current of sulphuric or sulphurous acid gas to escape through the soil and into the air, sufficient to completely drive away all ordinary cloud formation and to keep the atmosphere completely dry. All of the rainfall in that country is attended with a storm of wind sufficient to displace the escaping body of gas and allow precipitation, which usually lasts only for a short time. No slow and continued rains are common. No cloud formation above the visible horizon brings rain. No dews are seen, only in wet times, and at such times are extremely heavy, which

shows that other conditions are favorable if moisture was present.

That gases are escaping, note those large bare places on the surface of the earth where no grass will grow, called alkali spots, also that phenomena known as mirage, which is seen only in such countries, and by the vast fields of miles and miles of verdigris, left in the soil that has been brought up by the gases from beds of copper at unknown depths below, as well as particles of sulphur found in the soil. Those pools and springs of water abound in sulphur, lime, salt and verdigris, and known as bitter gyp water, that is neither palatable nor wholesome. And as water does not run above its fountain level, we know that these waters are impregnated with the gas or gas deposits, for those beds of copper have long been sought for below the springs' level.

Now, should the scientific gentleman see cause to enquire further, he may take a basin and place within it some pieces of copper, some lime, salt, and sulphur, then some acid. Cover the basin with earth on a wire net and let it stand in a well ventilated room. In a short time he may have a miniature climate and soil of western Texas, and by leaching the earth after continued fumigation he may get some bitter gyp water, not so strong, but it will show the truthfulness of the formation."

The above quotations will apply to all the countries lying within 200 miles east of the Rocky mountains and to many other localities on the globe. The suggestions that verdigris is formed by electrolyses, indicates that electricity, not sun heat, is the active agent, but while electricity may disintegrate the copper far down into the earth and bring it to the surface in the form of verdigris, sun heat could not do so.

Applying these laws to water evaporation not connected with saline soils, we readily see that the moisture that forms our North American rains must come from the saline waters of the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, where they are evaporated by the down-pouring pure air that comes to the earth's surface through the permanent high barometers on the electric currents that forever convey the air particles in a ceaseless round, coming to the earth in the high and going back into space through the lows.

That evaporation is a result of electrolyses is so clearly apparent that arguments appear useless, but orthodox scientists have declared that evaporation is a result of sun heat. In this as in many other things every orthodox scientist is as much in the way of progress as a mountain is an obstruction to railroad building.

Evaporation being a result of electrical action, by a plus charge of electricity, which lifts and bears away the particles of water, the reverse of this will cause precipitation, rainfall; therefore we must find paths by which the evaporated sea waters go to the interior of the continent, and there use such appliances as will rob the vapor currents of their excess of electricity.

Only along these lines can we hope to succeed in rainmaking, and herein is a field for the inventor. Necessity calls for a balloon so equipped that it will readily convey into the earth large quantities of electricity taken from the clouds in the southeast quadrant of passing low barometers.

The positions indicated is where the vapors from the Atlantic enter the lows that comes from the west, and it is confidently believed that rain can thus be produced in all arid countries.

The arid districts west of the Rockies are overflowed by rivers of vapors flowing northeast during the winter season, and northern Mexico by similar currents during the summer season.

South of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi, the rivers of vapor from the Gulf of Mexico flow to the north-east during the summer season, and when the tides in our atmosphere are high the moisture fails to precipitate and drouths ensue. Break these currents by robbing them of their electricity, and rain will follow.

The government has expended \$10,000 experimenting with dynamite in order to produce rain, and the same amount would pay the expense of testing the theory advocated in these bulletins.

Drouths are so destructive, and the arid districts of our country so extensive, that public interest demands that determined efforts be made to produce rain and to irrigate.

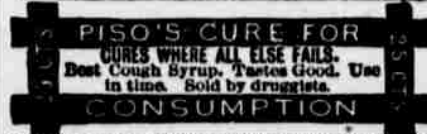

To Water Consumers.

Notice is hereby given to the patron of the city water service, of the city of Red Cloud, that section 24 of ordinance No. 43 hereunto annexed of said city will be strictly enforced hereafter:

It shall be unlawful for any person within said city to sprinkle, eject or throw water from private or public sprinkler, washer or hydrant upon any public street, lane or alley, or any yard garden or enclosure, or permit or cause the same to be done, nor upon or against any building upon such street, lane or alley, except for the extinguishment of fires and ordinary house cleaning except between the hours of 6 and 7 o'clock a. m. and 5 and 8 o'clock p. m., of each day; and any other person violating any of the provisions of this section shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars and stand committed until such costs and fine are paid.
