WEATHER BULLETIN

PROGNOSTICATIONS OF WEATHER.

Prepared and Published for Special Publication in the Red Cloud Chief by W. T. Foster.

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St. JOSEPH, Mo., July 20.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from July 18 to 22, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 28th, cross the western mountains by close of the 29th, the great central valleys from 30th to August 1st and the eastern states about August.

While this disturbance is crossing the continent severe earthquakes will probably occur in some of the earthquake countries.

The warm wave will cross the western mountains about the 28th, the central valleys about the 30th and the eastern states about August 1st. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about the 31st, the great central valleys about August 2d and the eastern states about August 4th.

The last week in July will be excessively hot and a general deficiency of rainfall may be expected.

INDUCED CURRENTS.

A current passing in one direction through a wire will cause a current to flow in the opposite direction through another wire. This is called induced current. One current is called the primary and the other the secondary current. The latter is the induced current.

Clerk Maxwell says: "If the primary current is maintained constant the induced current soon disappears and the primary current appears to produce no effect on the secondary circuit. If now the primary current is stopped a secondary current is observed which is in the same direction as the primary currents. Every variation of the primary current produces electromotive force in the secondary circuit. When the primary current increases the electromotive force is in the opposite direction to the current. When it diminishes, the electromotive force is in the same direction as the current. When the primary current is constant there is no electromotive force. These effects of induction are increased by bringing the wires nearer together."

Maxwell is one of our greatest authorities and the above quotation goes far toward explaining the influence of the planets on each other and on our weather changes. When we come to realize that electricity, not heat, is the cause of our weather changes we can readily perceive, by these laws of magnetism laid down by Maxwell and other undisputed authorities, how the moon and the planets may affect our weather by affecting the earth's magnetic currents.

The reader will become confused by the interchangeable use of the terms magnetism and electricity. In these bulletins electricity is always used as the cause, magnetism as the effect. Electricity moves in spirals and magnetism in straight lines across the electric currents. The total motion of magnetism is in the opposite direction to the total motion of electricity and in accord with the laws of the conservation of force there is in planetary space as much motion in one direction as in another, thereby perpetuating an equilibrium.

My theory is that the original impulse comes from outer space and consists of the ether of space moving in straight lines toward the center of all bodies, where, in such bodies as the earth, the ether is condensed into matter, making room for more ether which presses in to fill the vacuum caused by the condensation. This pressing of the ether from outer space is the original motion.

When a new magnet is introduced the currents in the neighboring magnet are increased or diminished and as the magnets approach each other the currents in each are in the opposite direction to what they are when the magnets recede.

Apply all this to the solar system in which the sun, moon and planets are surely the most perfect magnets known to man and we have a perfect system of cause and effect.

The changes on the earth's magnetic currents, both in force and direction, caused by the relative positions of the heavenly bodies give us all our weather changes.

There is a curious application of these induction laws to time pieces carried on the person. It is well known that magnetism affects the watch, but it is not so well understood that animal magnetism often has great influence on time pieces.

It is found that often a watch carried by one person will change its time when carried by another and there are persons of powerful magnetic qualities on whom no watch will keep good time.

The human system is a perfect magnet, the currents of which are controlled by the earth's currents. An able French physician, in treating nervous diseases requires his patients to walk barefooted on the bare ground. That is a common sense treatment. The human race was physically perfected before the mind had developed sufficiently to contrive coverings for the feet and therefore contact of the bare feet with the bare earth is necessary in order that the magnetic currents of the human system may continue to receive their impulse from the earth currents. Isolating our feet from the earth has somewhat the same effect on our physical condition as the taking of its roots from the earth has on the tree.

Fashion prevents grown people from going barefooted but children may, and should as much as possible, go with their bare feet exposed to the earth.

The theory of earthquakes, advocated by Prof. F. A. Forester, is that they are caused by electric currents, that these currents are increased at new moon, when the sun and moon combine their influence on the earth's electric currents, that when the new moon occurs at perigee—when the moon is the nearest to the earth—the effect is much greater and that when all these combinations occur near when the moon is crossing the earth's equator the earthquake causes are at their greatest.

This earthquake theory is in accord with the laws of induction quoted above from Clerk Maxwell. The Charleston S. C. earthquake of 1886, September 1, occurred near new moon near moon's perigee and when the moon was crossing the earth's equator.

Before any amendment can be made to the constitution of the United States the following procedure has to be gone through: The proposed reform must be carried first by two-thirds majority in the house of representatives, and then by a two-thirds majority in the senate. When this has been done, the amendment must be sent down to each of the separate states of the Federal Union. Of these there are 44 and each of them has two separate legislative bodies; their legislatures are chosen under varying conditions of suffrage, meet at different periods of the year, and prescribe each their own methods of procedure. Yet three-fourths of them must concur in an amendment. If there be one less than three-fourths, the amendment fails.

Suppose a law to have run all these gauntlets; to have passed the House and Senate, and if a constitutional amendment, three-fourths of the state legislatures; suppose it to have escaped the president's veto, or been passed over it by a vote of two-thirds of both houses, it has still to take its chance of being declared unconstitutional by the Supreme court of the United States. That is a check which can not be got rid of—as some others may—by eventually electing a new house, or a new senate or a new president. The Supreme court is not an elective body. The judges are appointed for life by the president. They are responsible to no popular tribunal; not even to public opinion. They sit as a court of pure law; the final authority from which in all America there is no appeal. Their jurisdiction strictly confined though it be, is co-extensive with the whole Union. It is the one instance in history in which popular sovereignty, acknowledged as supreme in the long run for every other purpose and over every other authority to which it has delegated power, submits to a master whom it did not appoint, and cannot remove, and cannot escape.

A unanimous vote of the people, the unanimous vote of the house and senate, and approval of the president would not make a statute law if this tribunal says it is not law.—Ex.

HE SHOT TO KILL.—About 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning the city was thrown into a fever of excitement, when pistol shots rang out on the morning air, and a crowd rushed to the dining room of the Linton House, where a deadly combat was in progress between L. P. Birchfield and Dr. J. B. Dykes. The circumstances as near as we can learn are; that on the night previous Mr. Birchfield accosted Mr. Dykes, on the street, and leveling his gun on him, threatened him and the latter being entirely unarmed, got away as best he could. At the breakfast table, Mr. Birchfield renewed his assault, and without any seeming provocation, other than an old grudge of some kind, opened fire with a five chambered pistol, emptying every barrel, at close range. Owing to the interference of the dining room girl, the first shot is supposed to have went wild, though three out of the last four took effect on the neck and head, and strange as it may seem none of the wounds was necessarily dangerous. In the meantime Mr. Dykes grappled with him, and having procured a gun, used the butt end of it over his head, inflicting some severe scalp wounds. At this writing the doctors' wounds have been dressed, and he is resting comfortably. The gall affair is deeply regretted by every body. Mr. Birchfield was placed under \$1,000 bond by Justice Meyers, until the 23d, when a hearing will be had.—Lebanon Journal.

Ordinance No. 59.

At a regular meeting of the council held at the Firemen's hall, July 5, 1894. Clerk was instructed to draft ordinance as follows: An ordinance providing for the levying of taxes upon all the taxable property of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska for the fiscal year commencing on the first Tuesday in May 1894.

SEC. I. Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, that the following taxes be and the same are hereby levied upon all the taxable property of said city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, for the fiscal year commencing on the first Tuesday in May 1894.

For general revenue purposes to meet the current expenses and liabilities of said city exclusive of interest and liabilities on outstanding bonds ten (10) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all the taxable property of said city.

For the payment of interest on water bond seven and one-half (7½) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all the taxable property of said city.

For the payment of interest on electric light plant bond two (2) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all the taxable property of said city.

For operating, extending and maintaining water works seven (7) mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all the taxable property of said city.

SEC. II. And be it further ordained that the city clerk of said city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, be and is hereby directed to certify under the seal of the said city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, to the county clerk of Webster county, Nebraska, the number of mills on the dollar of taxes levied as herein before enumerated for all city properties as herein before set forth.

SEC. III. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after its adoption and publication as provided by law.
