COUNTY LEGISLATURE

A BRIEF MENTION OF THEIR DOINGS.

Bills Allowed—Reports of Committees—And Other Notes of Interest to the People.

On motion the application of the citizens of school district 33, to renew their bond of \$100 and to cancel on the treasurer's books the bond tax levied for 1893 was referred to the committee on school bonds and mandamus.

A motion by Best that the board deviate from former years and collect all delinquent taxes to the best advantage of the county, not setting a precedent for any year was lost.

The county treasurer was authorized to correct the assessment of Samuel Fuller for 1893 erroneously placed at \$387 when it should have been \$187 and to collect tax on that basis.

M. Finkenbinder complained that the new law and section 34, 1. 11, is erroneously assessed. On motion he is instructed to pay the tax under protest and present bill for excess.

The committee on school bonds recommended the rejection of the petition of residents of school district 33, laid on the table.

The personal taxes of A T Reed for 1885 6 7 and 8 were stricken from the tax list on his statement that he had paid them and lost his receipt.

The committee on poor farm was instructed to lease said farm reserving the right to erect buildings.

The report of Treasurer White was read and approved.

Moved and seconded that the county treasurer be instructed not to enforce the collection of B F Reed's personal taxes of 1884 from B F Reed, stepson of A T Reed—Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that Messrs McNitt and Fassler be notified to appear before this board, answering to money paid to them under protest.

Motion amended that they be requested to appear before the board at 10 o'clock a. m.—Amendment carried. Original motion put as amended and carried.

Now comes Mr. Ely and states to the board that he thinks that he paid the county his taxes for the year 1887 and 1888, amounting to \$9 90, assessed in Guide Rock, and asks the board to strike the same from the books.

Motion made and seconded that the county treasurer be ordered to proceed to collect the personal taxes of Mr. Ely—Motion carried.

Mr. Fassler appears before the board and makes his statement regarding taxes paid under protest, and after due consideration a motion was made and carried that Mr. Fassler be excused and be allowed to go home and not required to appear by tomorrow morning as ordered by the board.

Motion made to adjourn to meet tomorrow morning at 8 a. m.

Thursday morning July 12, 1894 board met pursuant to adjournment. Jacob Kindscher acting chairman. 14 members present.

Jacob Kindscher, chairman, makes statement of bridge committee regarding the old Guide Rock bridge.

To the Hon. board of supervisors—I hereby make a statement of moneys and credits taken in for lumber on old Guide Rock bridge since last meeting. J. Kindscher, Chm'n Bridge Com.

And credited the same on my claim. Chair appointed as committee to examine and report on same, Laird and Zimmerman. Committee report as follows:

We, your committee to examine this account, find it correct. W C Laird, P C Zimmerman

Moved and carried that the report of the committee be approved. Committee on school lands and mandamus reported.

Moved and carried that the report of the committee be approved. Now comes M B McNitt and C Fassler as requested by the board and make statement regarding taxes paid under protest, and after due consideration they agreed to turn over to J S White, the present county treasurer, the money held by them in taxes under protest.

Motion made and seconded that the personal tax of W H Givits, assessed in the year 1892 at \$0, be reduced to 16, being an erroneous assessment—Motion carried.

Now at this time R C Best makes application to the board, asking the board to reduce the assessment on ne 1 35 4, 12, assessed for the year 1894 to J R Snice and assessed at \$410.

Moved and seconded that the assessment for the year 1894 be reduced from \$410 to \$205 and clerk ordered to correct the assessors books and extend tax accordingly—Motion carried.

Motion made and carried that the personal taxes of G H Sanderson be referred to the committee on taxes.

Committee on taxes make report on taxes as follows: We, your committee on tax, have examined the assessment of Sarah Hall on lots 1 to 7, Guide Rock, assessed in the year 1892 and 1893, and find property for the year 1892 assessed at \$100 and for the year 1893 assessed at \$170 as Mr. Wait is acquainted with the property and states that there has been no change made.

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We, your committee, recommend the refunding to Sarah Hall the sum of \$4 on account of erroneous assessment. W M Crabill, A H Spracher

Moved and carried that the report of the committee be adopted. Moved and carried that the board instruct the county attorney to consult with the city attorney and make a report on the poor in the city, to report by tomorrow at 8 o'clock a. m.—Motion carried.

Moved and carried that the board adjourn to give the committees time to report until 4 o'clock p. m. Thursday Jan 12, 1894.

4 o'clock p. m board met pursuant to adjournment. A H Hoffman, chairman, 16 members present.

Committee on taxes make report as follows: Red Cloud, Neb., July 12, 1894—We, your committee on taxes in the Geo Warren and McNitt trouble, find the treasurer's records that Geo Warren received the taxes on his warrant in the year 1887, leaves a balance on the warrant of \$13.57 in McNitt's hands to be applied on future tax, and the committee recommended to the board that M B McNitt pay the balance of \$13.57 with interest from date.

W M Crabill, A H Spracher, Com. A H Kaley.

Moved and seconded that the report of the committee be approved. Ayes 14—Nays 1—Motion carried.

In the matter of V S Hall's personal tax, moved and carried that the matter be referred to the committee for further investigation.

In the matter of the application of S A Redden regarding personal taxes Moved and carried that the report of the committee be approved.

Committee on printing made report as follows: July 12, 1894, to the Hon board of Supervisors: We, your committee on printing, would recommend letting THE NATION have the delinquent tax list for the year 1894.

Amendment made that the word Red Cloud Chief be inserted in the motion instead of THE NATION—Amendment lost, Original motion put and carried.

Committee on settlement with the sheriff and jailor made report. Moved and carried that the report of the committee be approved.

Motion to adjourn to meet tomorrow morning at 8 a. m.

Friday morning July 13, 1894. 8 o'clock a. m. board met pursuant to adjournment. J Kindscher chairman. 15 members present.

Committee on roads made report which was approved.

Committee on official bonds reported favorable on official bond of H H Peck. O H R D No 4, which was approved. Report of D M Hunter county Supt. Moved and carried that report of committee be approved.

Now comes W T Auld and complains to the board that in the year 1887 he was erroneously assessed in Beaver Creek township. Moved and carried that the same be referred to committee on taxes.

Petition of Inavale township read, etc. Moved that report of committee be adopted—Carried.

Petition from Beaver Creek read etc. Moved that report of committee be adopted—Carried. Petition from Elm Creek read etc. Moved the report of the committee be adopted—carried.

Petition from Elm Creek. Moved and carried that report of committee be adopted.

Petition from Guide Rock—Moved and carried that report of committee be approved.

Petition from Batin township—Moved and carried that report of committee be approved.

Rosemont petition. Moved and seconded that report of committee be approved. Motion made that the petition be laid over until 1 o'clock p. m. Carried—Laid over until next meeting.

Request of Jacob Kindscher regarding the Red Cloud bridge. Moved and carried that report be approved.

Moved that the bridge committee be authorized to proceed to repair and fix the Red Cloud bridge in as good repair and condition as the same can be done—Carried.

Motion to adjourn to meet at 1 p. m. 1 p m board met pursuant to adjournment. A H Hoffman chairman 17 members present.

T E Penman appeared before the board and stated that in the year 1893 he was assessed for 800 in merchandise and that there is an erroneous assessment of said merchandise of \$600 in proportion to what other stocks were assessed at and asks the board to reduce the taxes as above stated from \$800 to \$207 being an erroneous assessment.

Motion made that the county refund T E Penman the sum of \$35.46—Carried. Report of committee was adopted.

A petition from Garfield township recommended by bridge committee to give portions of Guide Rock bridge to that township, and that county also give them \$25 was duly carried by the board.

The board then adjourned until 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Board met Saturday morning as per adjournment; 15 members present. The petition of W. N. Richardson and J. S. Rothrock asking a change of Walnut creek boundary, was referred to committee on boundary lines. In the matter of the statement of W. T. Auld, a motion to approve was lost. A petition and remonstrance from Garfield township and Pleasant Hill was referred to committee on boundary.
