The State Fair has been moved to Omaha. This move was surely one of unthoughtfulness on the part of the directors, as Omaha is too far away and cannot possibly expect to draw the crowds that Lincoln did. But some people are always putting their foot in it.

The management of the Tecumseh Milling company announces that it will give a sack of flour to every family in the county that is unable to buy the same. The conditions are that the head of the family does not drink, use tobacco or keep a dog.—State Journal. It is needless to add that they will give away but very little flour.

The democratic stagger at the financial problem has lowered the gold reserve to \$71,000,000 again, and unless some relief comes, the Cleveland administration will have to borrow another \$50,000,000. During Harrison's term the public debt was reduced \$214,000,000 quite a contrast with Cleveland's, which has increased it \$100,000,000 up to date with two more years to go on.

McNitt of Webster, who occupied the chair while yesterday, gave ample evidence that the house would have made no mistake if it had elected him speaker. He is well posted in parliamentary law, exceptionally clear headed, a good lawyer and prompt and energetic. He will be one of the most useful members of the house in its general work as he seldom shows up on the wrong side of any question.—State Journal.

APPROVES to the aid fund for the drouth stricken people, the Honorable County Board in session Wednesday had quite a little discussion as to whether Webster county should go on record as destitute and charity seeking or not. It was stated it was said, the State Journal recently contained an item to that effect, and Chairman Hoffman made a sensible and vigorous speech opposing such action by the board. He showed plainly that Webster county was abundantly able to take care of herself, and that advertising it to the contrary was permanently injurious and detrimental. A resolution was unanimously adopted requiring the board to notify Secretary Ludden that Webster county is not asking for aid, and also ask the State Journal to correct its statement. No sir! It will be after several more drouths when Webster county can't take care of its own poor.

We have been receiving quite a number of letters in the last few days from eastern papers asking about Nebraska's starving poor. Some letters contain furious statements in regard to the condition of our people, that is not even heard here. There may be a goodly number in the western portion that are subjects of charity, but Webster county has but very few people who will need succor from those who are better off than they. The generosity of the eastern people is appreciated but the magnified stories that are circulated in eastern states about Nebraska's destitution are simply a great injury to the state. Destitution does exist in some of the western counties, but eastern people should remember that Nebraska is a great state and with a few exceptions is hard to beat as an agricultural producing state. Nebraska is all right, and in any year where eastern people have full crops Nebraska will be with them.

THE search for Barrett Scott the Holt county defaulter whom everyone knows about, was suddenly terminated Saturday night when his body was dragged from beneath the ice in the Niobrara river. The body was frozen entirely and three feet of rope was hanging to his neck, which plainly showed he was lynched. His hands were tied behind him, and his watch and chain were still in place on his person. Everyone who had ever known the ex-treasurer recognized him at once, and hundreds of citizens viewed the remains before autopsy. This awful crime is an everlasting blot upon Holt county, and it is to be deplored that such circumstances really do exist. The perpetrators of the foul deed are still unknown but the prevailing supposition is that the ones now under arrest are the guilty parties, and will suffer accordingly by law.

On motion Geo W Hagan was appointed as one of the Soldier's Rest commissioners for the term of the years. Moved and carried that the board comply with sec 14, page 788, compiled statutes of 1893. This statute compels the board to erect tombstones on the graves of dead soldiers, whose relatives are unable to do so. Resolution by Watt: Resolved that the chairman be instructed to notify Secretary Ludden and the State Journal that Webster county is not on the list of counties having applied for aid. Carried by 16 votes. We your committee on taxes recommended the treasurer be authorized to strike from the tax list the taxes against lots 3, 4 and 5, block 1, Red Cloud city for the years 1888 and 1889. Said property belonging to the church of Christ, W. M. Crabill, P. Hill and C. Shultz, committee. The same committee recommended that the treasurer be authorized to collect from R. M. Martin the taxes for the year 1892 together with the interest and cost. Also that they had no jurisdiction in the case of J. S. Haver for taxes. The reports were adopted. A resolution by Kindescher cutting the salaries of bridge supervisors on bridge work to two dollars per day after the first two days was adopted. The committee on cemetery consisting of Cox, Hill and Kort recommended the three graves be moved to lot 6 or 7. A resolution by R. C. Best to instruct the clerk and chairman of the board to secure money from the treasurer's office in cases of insanity while the board is not in session was adopted. Committee on supplies recommended after careful investigation that a safe be purchased from R. M. Martin for the county judge's records at a cost of \$125. Approved. Committee on ways and means reported they had examined the sureties on bank bonds and recommended their continuance. Approved. Jas. Bromfield submitted a resolution requiring the county attorney to notify the B. & M. railroad to fix the road and crossing at the narrows near Inavale, it being a very unsafe place. Carried. Moved by Cox that the price paid for the Webster county, bar docket should not exceed \$30. Carried.
