TERRIBLE DISASTER.

Atlantic Liner Elbe Lost With Nearly All on Board.

HUNDREDS WERE DROWNED.

About Twenty Survivors Landed at Lowestoft by a Fishing Smack.

SLEEPING PASSENGERS CAUGHT.

Nebraska Man Among the Survivors—Began to Sink Immediately After the Collision and Went Down in Twenty Minutes—Survivors Were Nearly Frozen When Picked Up.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—The North German Lloyd steamer Elbe, Captain Von Dossat, from Bremen for New York, via Southampton, has been sunk in collision with the British steamer Crathie, bound from Rotterdam for Aberdeen.

Majority of Passengers Germans. When the news of the disaster became generally known in the clubs and places of public resort, the excitement was intense.

From the details now at hand it is learned the Elbe was proceeding along at her usual rate of speed and keeping the ordinary lookouts.

W. D. Spencer was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary at Devil's Lake, N. D., for killing Archie McIntyre.

The Rev. John E. Massey of Richmond, Va., has sued the Rev. Sam Small for \$50,000 damages on the basis of an alleged libel in The Pilot, edited by Small.

The Burlington fast mail has just made record time between Burlington and Ottumwa. The 76 miles was made in 80 1/2 minutes, including three stops.

The American Baptist Missionary union conference began at Kalamazoo, Mich., to last two days.

J. E. Hannegan has been appointed general passenger agent of the Indiana, Illinois and Iowa.

Illinois agriculture board accepts plans for new state fair buildings, which are estimated to cost \$248,000.

Fishermen are combing at Muskegon, Mich., to fight the state law prohibiting spearing on inland waters.

Over 100 graduates of the Iowa State university held a banquet at Algona and organized an alumni association.

Illinois State Bar association, in session in Springfield, suggested many new laws and discussed the railway strike.

Mayor Hutchins of Rockford, Ill., has been invited with power to make removals at will by an appellate court decision.

Charles Martin of Elgin, Ill., has sued the Pinkerton agency of Chicago for false imprisonment in connection with the failure of the St. Charles Evaporated Cream company.

George Hunter, superintendent of the watch factory at Elgin, Ill., was acquitted of the charge of employing women more than eight hours a day. The law was held to be unconstitutional.
