EDITORIAL NOTES.

It is to be hoped that the legislature will bear in mind that the people are already overburdened with useless laws on the statute books. What they want is fewer laws and good ones, and an early adjournment.

HON. RANDOLPH MCNITT arrived home Friday night last and visited with relatives and friends until Sunday evening. Ranney has been doing some hard work in the general assembly but is looking hale and hearty.

The Riverton Review and Franklin Sentinel are tearing up the earth, and tinging the placid waters of the historic Republican with blood. The town of Franklin is said to be securely fortified and the timid people of Riverton stay indoors after 4 o'clock p. m. Some gentlemen belonging to the board of supervisors of that county are charged with the origin of this cruel war.

ABOUT a year ago there was considerable commotion in pension circles because the Commissioner of Pensions had cut Judge Long's pension from \$72 a month down to \$60. Judge Long is one of the supreme judges in the state of Michigan. He was so badly wounded during the war that he requires the constant assistance of an attendant to dress his wounds. Judge Long appealed from the Commissioner to Judge Bradley, of the District Supreme Court in Washington, and a decision was rendered this week which restores Judge Long to his original pension. Judge Bradley denies the right of the Commissioner to revoke a pension on his own motion, and plainly tells the Commissioner that he is neither congress nor the government to change laws to suit his ideas.

It is now estimated that three hundred thousand persons and corporations will contribute to the government revenue, through the income tax law, and that not less than \$50,000,000 will be collected. It has also been decided that congressmen will even have to pay on their mileage as well as their salaries. There is a great deal of outcry against the income tax, but when it is looked at from all sides there is certainly no great hardship in it. The wealth of the country should certainly pay its share of the expenses of government, as well as the poorer classes. Some of the millionaires in the east pay taxes on less than \$20,000 when it is well known that some of them are the owners of that many millions.

SINCE the county board passed the resolution striking Webster county off from the list of those counties seeking aid, there comes a pathetic wail from a great many people in the county. The greatest objection comes from farmers in poor circumstances, who can't possibly determine where they will secure feed and seed. It is a fact, that many farmers, while by no means in destitute circumstances, are wholly at loss to know how to furnish feed for their stock during the winter and then how to get seed to plant in the spring. For instance a substantial farmer of this county has a large farm and about one hundred head of stock, all of which is mortgaged lightly. There is no use in trying to borrow money he can't do that, and his cattle will not survive the cruel winter blasts without food. Thus he is placed in a very pitiable condition. There are a great many farmers of this kind in the county, and its only natural toy, for they did not raise anything. Such men as these have been circulating a petition throughout the county, which doubtless finds many signers. The really poverty stricken people of this county can be

amply taken care of by our own county, especially if their wants are known, but the class of farmers named above are the ones who really deserve help from the outside.

The storm of Wednesday was general in its fury throughout the state. The trains have been delayed, but there is little loss of stock reported. It was one of the most violent winter blasts that ever came to the state, but was not attended by the usual amount of snow and the loss of stock resulting therefrom. The renowned sport and leader of New York's "Four Hundred"—Ward McAllister, died a his home in that city last week.
