Where Some of the Money Went
The editor of the Belt says the present city government have spent all the money by the first of November and have nothing to show for it. It is very easy to sit in his office and make such assertions, without taking any pains to ascertain whether he is correct. Here is where some of the money went to. At the meeting of the city council on May 2, the salaries of the mayor, council and city clerk for the year 1893 were paid out of the occupation fund to the amount of \$400. At the meeting held on July 6th, bills to the amount of \$517.10 for the previous year were paid. Also at the same meeting the Gutta Percha Rubber Company were paid \$508.65 for 500 feet of new hose for the fire department. Seems to me that I have seen that new hose some where. There has also been furnished a new smokestack for the engine house. Besides repairs to the amount of some \$150 for the pump. The entire system of hydrants and plugs were put in repair, cost of \$100. A carload of oak lumber was used in the cross walks of the city, and at least one-half a car of pine on the sidewalks of the city. Four streets were graded and put in repair to one of the former city government. One item I had almost forgotten is \$15, was paid to the senior editor of the Belt for legal advice, a bill handed down to us from the former administration, and I do not know what that was for, so there is \$15 I can see no return for. Also some \$750 for coal to run the city engine has been paid out in cold cash. Numerous other items could be mentioned but space forbids. W. B. ROY.
