The question arises, who will be mayor? The administration coming to a close soon has been a good one and Mayor Roby and the council have done all in their power to give the city an honest and economical administration. Owing to the low valuation of city property for the last two or three years, the levies have been too small to be of much benefit in making necessary improvements, yet the council has paid off \$1000 worth of bills belonging to its predecessor, besides repairing walks, buying hose, paying interest, making repairs, buying coal, &c. The mayor and council have to be governed according to the exigencies of the occasion and the law bearing on the same. The levy has to be made according to the valuation, and only 85 per cent of the levy can be used legally, and when that is done, warrants cannot be issued further. It is easy to decry the council, but is there any other set of men that can do better than the present council under the circumstances? We think not.
