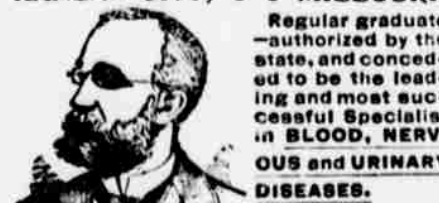

THE GRAND LODGE OF THE A. O. U. W.

Reasons Why the Session of 1895 Was Abandoned.

The Substance of the Defense Made by the Officers of the Order in the Recent Suit.

The article in last Thursday's Journal in reference to the suit commenced in the district court by certain members of the Ancient Order of United Workmen against the grand lodge officers of that order has created much interest throughout the state. As there are more than eighteen thousand members of that order in Nebraska any matter bringing into question the policy or acts of the officers naturally attracts much attention. The suit was brought, as was previously stated in these columns, by William Gray, C. F. Barras and H. M. Casebeer, members of the order, living in Lincoln, for a writ of mandamus to compel Grand Master Workman J. G. Tait, or Acting Grand Master Workman R. W. Laffin, to issue instructions to the lodges of the state to elect representatives to a grand lodge session to be held at Kearney in May, 1895. The claims of the grand lodge officers, and the grounds on which they intend to resist the petition for mandamus are substantially as follows: The assertion that Grand Master Workman Tait sent notice to the lodges that no grand lodge session would be held this year on account of lack of funds, is denied, and the reason of waiving the session is said to be that in month of October, 1894, Grand Island lodge No. 1 sent to the grand master workman a resolution asking him to submit to the lodges of the state a proposition to waive the session of 1895, in view of the fact that many members of the order had been rendered destitute by the failure of crops, and to use the money which the assistance of such needy members. This proposition was submitted by the grand master workman to the lodges of the state for their action, and out of a total of 308 lodges then in existence, only twelve voted in the negative, and 298 lodges voted in favor of the proposition to waive the session of the grand lodge, which was thereupon declared carried. On this practically unanimous vote of the lodges of the state, Mr. Tait issued his proclamation as grand master workman, stating that no session of the grand lodge would be held in 1895 and that the estimated expense of such session, \$8,000 would be set aside from the grand lodge funds as a special relief fund for the purpose of providing for the necessities and maintaining in good standing within the order those members who, by reason of the drouth and failure of crops had been rendered unable to provide for themselves. The assertion that the grand master workman arbitrarily instructed the subordinate lodges not to elect representatives to the grand lodge because of lack of funds is shown by the foregoing statements to be entirely untrue. The waiving or postponement of the grand lodge session is fully indorsed by nearly every member of the order in Nebraska, and the practical good effects of the use of the funds referred to have been realized by many lodges situated within the district suffering from the drouth of 1894.

In reference to the alleged defalcation of ex-Grand Recorder Payne, it is admitted that after the election of Payne as grand recorder in 1893, there occurred a small deficiency in his accounts, where-upon he was compelled to resign the office of grand recorder. It is set forth that the deficiency is in the process of collection a part of the shortage having been paid. It is further set forth that the bond of Payne is good and that the principal bondsmen have been fully consulted in the matter and have agreed to the plan which has been taken, by which the funds belonging to the grand lodge will be paid into the treasury within a reasonable time, the plan adopted having been intended to collect the amount without forcing the bondsmen to pay said deficiency. It is stated, however, that the bondsmen hold themselves in readiness and have agreed to make good the amount at any time that they may be called upon; and that there is no danger of the order losing any money through the Payne shortage.

It is pointed out that the action of the lodges of the ancient Order of

are making liberal donations of money to assist in providing seed grain for the members of the order in Nebraska who are in need. It is claimed that should the grand lodge session be held, the action of the grand master workman, in soliciting this assistance would be made to appear ridiculous. It is further stated that the members of the order who bring this suit acting entirely upon their own responsibility their acts and sentiments have been specifically disavowed by the lodges to which they belong.

In the absence of Grand Master Workman Tait service of the petition was had upon Grand Foreman R. W. United Workmen in Nebraska has been the subject of much commendation wherever it is known. The amount of relief which has been furnished the destitute families through this agency has been very great, and was only made possible by the waiving of the grand lodge session and turning the funds, which that session would have consumed, into the channels of relief. Grand Master Workman Tait is now visiting grand lodges in eastern jurisdictions, and those bodies, and in fact the order at large all over the country Laffin, who is at present the acting head of the order in Nebraska. A demurrer was filed on Wednesday and argued before Judge Hall Saturday afternoon. The judge will decide on the demurrer on Monday.—State Journal.

NOTE—Since the above defense was put in type, the court has decided that it was not in the province of the Grand Master Workman or any others to abate the session of the grand lodge, basing his judgment on the constitutional requirements. Therefore unless the case is appealed to a higher court the grand lodge will hold its regular session.
