### EDITORIAL NOTES.

The city of Lincoln assumes activity once a year, and that is when every man, woman and child becomes crazy over municipal politics. Just now everybody is running for mayor.

Our representative T. G. Wilder has succeeded in seeing his bill declaring sugar factories internal improvement and authorizing communities to vote bonds for their establishment, recommended for passage in the house by the committee on the whole.

And still the most desperate attempts to impeach President Cleveland are being resorted to, both in Washington and elsewhere. We understand that Hon. T. J. Ward of this city is circulating a petition to have him removed, and Jeff's strenuous efforts in that direction will doubtless enhance his own likelihood for election from the south ward.

Gov. HOLCOMB yesterday honored Dr. Robert Damerell of this city with the appointment of superintendent of the Hastings asylum for the chronic insane, vice Dr. Johnson resigned. Although the senate has not yet acted on the appointment, there is said to be little doubt of its speedy confirmation. The Hastings asylum is one of Nebraska's largest public buildings, and now has about 500 inmates, which is conclusive evidence that the physician assuming the superintendency of that institution must be qualified to an eminent degree. Dr. Damerell is exceedingly popular in this county, both socially and professionally, having a lucrative practice and extensive acquaintance up and down the valley. THE CHIEF felicitates Dr. Damerell upon his distinguished appointment, and while we regret his departure, we also congratulate Hastings upon the advent of a typical gentleman and thorough physician.

EX-CONGRESSMAN MCKEIGHAN, having concluded his labors in the national city, returned home to the shades of private life last Friday, much improved in health and very bright in spirits. His eyes however still trouble him and one of those organs will be forever useless. On his way home Mr. McKeighan attended the reception given Senator Allen, and won the laurels of the evening in the most brilliant extemporaneous effort of his life. Mr. McKeighan was certainly feeling well, for if correctly reported, his speech was one profusion of glittering sentences, favorable to the ladies of the event. At any rate it elicited more flattering compliments than any member on the program, and the fact that the speaker came accidentally, is conclusive evidence that it is wholly impromptu. Mrs. W. J. ### A Patriot's Reward.

When the low rumble of war was heard away back in the beginning of 1861, Sylvester Day was a young man. He was fired with zeal for the protection of Old Glory, and when the battle became fierce and the demand for men became more imperative he enlisted and followed the flag with all the patriotism of a native born. He was a good soldier and always ready for duty. The active, vigorous young man of 1861 is now almost a physical wreck. Not long ago a benevolent government gave the broken down old soldier the munificent pension of six or eight dollars per month. He expected a higher rating, for his disabilities demanded it. But the democratic congress made six dollars the minimum, and then Hoke Smith began to cut off all the veterans who were drawing that small sum. Mr. Day's name was in the list, and this week he received a notice from Hoke Smith's department that his name was Dennis, and that this great government could not afford to squander its money on the fellows who had "fit agin the stars and bars." Mr. Day will have to wait and pray for the election of a republican president in 1896. The pensions of many other old soldiers have been disallowed or cut down, and in many instances lopped off. If THE CHIEF had its way every old soldier would have a pension, whether he was worth much or little.

A portion of the high school graduating class which has been studying German are up in arms again because three of the class were permitted to drop the study at the beginning of the term on account of other and numerous studies that they were compelled to make up in order to graduate. The parents, according to a decision of the supreme court, have a right to have their children excused from any study that they desire. So this class failing to have the board decide in favor of discontinuance of the study had their parents order the Professor to discontinue the study. A meeting of the board will be held Monday when it is expected that they will decide that the class will have to study the course or fail to graduate. The board and the professor thought that the German was a necessary study at the beginning of the term and do not seem to have altered their opinion in any way. There seems to be various opinions on the subject as to the why and wherefore of the class in refusing to study German.
