Crop Indications.

"In February of the present year the World-Herald published an article of mine on 'Forecasting the Seasons,' in which I ventured to predict that the summer of 1895 will resemble that of 1884, with its abundant crops, with the exception of a danger point to the fruit crop in this latitude during April and May, which we may escape through the prevalence of rain or clouds during the few days of danger in these months. When looking over some old charts the last week I found one drawn by me, dated in February, 1884, giving the forecasts of that summer as a good year for crops. That year and its big crops have since become history. Venus passed

between the earth and the sun in July 1884, while the present year it will pass us in September. In 1892 Venus passed us again in July. This brought the rainy months in May, June and July during those bountiful years, while should the same analogy hold the present season, and I see no reason why it should not, the rainy months will be in June, July and August. As Venus is now rapidly approaching the earth we are already feeling its influence with the advancing season. That beautiful planet is well named the 'friend to mankind,' because when near the earth in the growing seasons it always brings us blessings, fruit and flowers. If it fails this year it will be contrary to its records for centuries."

"A further examination of these old charts brought me one dated in February, 1881, with its forecast for that summer. It was dismal with its prediction of short crops. That year the earth passed through the midst of the intense solar energies to drive Neptune, Saturn, Jupiter and Mars around the sun, while Coggia's comet blazed in the sky—always an uncertain factor in meteorology and astronomy. In the summer of 1890 and 1894 the earth again passed through the solar energy controlling Jupiter and Mars. It was an era of hot winds and famine."

"But enough of these disasters. Unless a big comet comes the present season to upset all known calculations there is no known reason why this should not be a year of bountiful crop with the danger to fruit noted, which we may escape. The farmer should see to it that his corn and other crops are planted just as soon as the ground is in condition. There should be no late planted corn anywhere this year. In that there is danger. After the 19th of September the earth will enter a cool region in space, and a killing frost early in October may work irreparable damage to the unfortunate who is late putting in his crops this spring.—Gen. E. F. Test in World-Herald.
