

Weather Bulletin.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., April 27.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from Apr 28th to May 2d and the next will reach the Pacific coast about May 3d, cross the western mountain country by close of 4th, the great central valleys from 5th to 7th and the eastern states about the 8th.

This disturbance will average above the normal in force and will be much like the storm that crossed the continent from 5th to 10 of April.

Heavy rains will occur only in small localities and drouth will generally prevail during the passing of this storm.

The second storm wave of May will reach the Pacific coast about the 9th cross the west of Rockies country by close of 10th, the great central valleys 11th to 13th and eastern states about the 14th.

Rainfall from this storm will be light but better distributed than from the preceding disturbance.

Rainfall of May will be much heavier in the southern states east of 95th meridian than in the northern states.

The warm wave will cross the west of Rockies country about May 3d and 9th, the great central valleys 5th and 11th and the eastern states 7th and 13th. The cool wave will cross the west of Rockies country about May 6th and 12th, great central valleys 8th and 14th and the eastern states 10th and 16th.

It is desirable that forecasts should be made local as far as possible and I am gradually bringing my general forecasts of temperature and rainfall to smaller districts. For a time I will use in these bulletins nine districts to cover the United States but hope soon to increase the number.

North Pacific slope temperature for May will be below, rainfall above normal.

South Pacific slope temperature above and rainfall below.

Upper Missouri valley and Manitoba temperature above and rainfall below.

Nebraska, eastern Colorado, eastern New Mexico, western Kansas and western Texas, temperature above and rainfall below.

Upper Mississippi valley and Upper lakes, temperature above and rainfall below.

Lower Missouri and lower Mississippi valleys, temperature below and rainfall above.

Ohio valley and lower lakes, temperature above and rainfall below.

Tennessee, North Carolina and the country south of them, temperature below and rainfall above.

Atlantic coast, Virginia north and all that country east of the Alleghanies, temperature about normal and rainfall below.

Following are about the average temperatures in degrees and rainfall in inches of the above named districts for May.

Brilliant auroras in May will probably be observed near the 4th, 19th and 31st and the severest storms about the same dates. Heaviest rains will occur from 15th to 25th, principally in the southeastern states.

Frosts in northern states about 6th to 8th and 17th to 19th.

EQUINOCTIAL STORMS. Orthodox scientists continue to write about equinoctial storms declaring against such occurrences and the latest epistle claims that from long observations at Galveston, Texas no evidence was found supporting the equinoctial storm theory.

The records show that university graduates have not made more valuable discoveries and inventions than have been made by those who have special and not universal educations. Education develops but does not make brains.

The belief in equinoctial storms is common among common people, more particularly in reference to the March equinox. The common people are close observers of matters that materially affect their every day affairs and from very long experience they have been led to believe that March is the wind month and this blustery weather in some way is connected with the equinoxes.

Mr. R. H. Scott of London, England, Dr. I. M. Cline, of Galveston, weather bureau forecaster, and Prof. Hazen, of Washington have published articles to prove that these common people have been misled by their experiences.

They were all careful in selecting September for their investigations when, as is well known the effects of the equinoxes are not so great on the continent but September is in the very center of the greatest tropical hurricanes of the season. They all avoid these hurricanes, however.

In some sections of the country March is notably a tornado month. This is true of Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas as shown by Lieut. Finley's reports. In several states September is the tornado month.

Planetary meteorologists do not claim that the equinoxes originate or increase the number of storms but that the force of these storms are increased by the equinoxes. Therefore the number of storms will not be increased at any given locality but the equinox may cause an ordinary storm to develop into a tornado. The critics have not investigated this point.

It is not claimed that more storm occur on March and September 21st at any one place, but that from about the 10th to the last of these months the force of storms is increased.

The only fair test of these theories would be to take the total wind movement and barometric readings of the principal strms that cross the continent in March and September within six days of the equinoxes and also the tropical hurricanes for the same period in September. As this has not been done the common experience of the common people is their best guide.



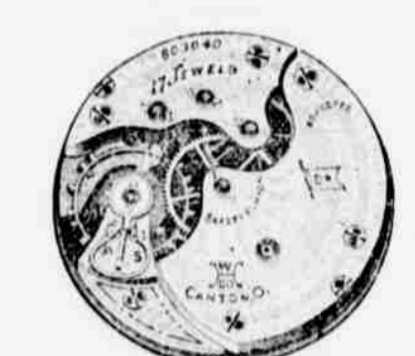
