

St. Joseph, Mo., May 4 .- My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 4 to 8 and 10 to 14 and the next will reach the Pacific coast about May 14, cross the western mountain country by elose of 15th, the great central valleys from 16th to 18th and the eastern states about the 19th,

This disturbance will bring some of the heaviest rains of the month but these rains will not generally occur where most needed. The tendency will be decidedly toward too much rain in the southeastern states and a deficiency toward the northwest.

Warm wave will cross the west of Rockies country about 14th, great central valleys 16th and eastern states 18th. Cool wave will cross west of Rockies country about 17th, great central valleys 19th and eastern states

SENSIBLE TEMPERATURES.

There are two very distinct kinds of temperatures and two kinds of thermometers for recording them. One of these temperatures is that of a dry the other a wet atmosphere. Zero weather in a dry atmosphere along the 40th degree of north latitude would be a Paradise compared with the same temperature in a damp atmosphere and a temperature of 100 in dry atmosphere is as agreeable to man and beast as 80 in an atmosphere saturated with evaporated water.

Capt. Glassford, formerly connected with the national weather bureau, now chief signal officer of the army, department of the Colorado and stationed at Denver, recently published an article in which he says:

"There are in all temperature records two elements, the sensible temperature and the apparent temperature or that which expresses the heat or cold felt by the human being; and had no experience in new countries. the apparent temperature, a mere record of how the mechanical thermometer is affected. 'The resulting evaporation about the wetted blub is similar to that of the clothed human body from which the perspiration is evaporated, thus causing coolness. The coolness is in direct ratio to the dryness of the air; that is, the dryer the atmosphere the greater the evaporation and consequent.". X X X

"The converse of this is true in winter; that is, the dryer the air the less the discomfort felt from extreme cold. Perhaps all have experienced the dangerous chilling effect of very cold weather accompanied by a damp atmosphere."

By a map Capt. Glassford illustrates the average temparature for July showing the sensible temperature to be, for the northern parts of the United States. 61.4 and the mechanieal temperature \$3.1 degrees.

As to the effects on animal life, proably also to some extent on vegetable life, this gives to the east half of the United States a much colder sensible temperature in winter and a much warmer sensible temperature in summer than is experienced in the west half. All this results from the difference in amount of moisture in the atmosphere.

To some extent this will explain the popularity of my weather bulletins and why they have a circulation of over two million copies weekly.

A very large portion of the people -perhaps ninety-nine out of a hundred-make their estimates of weather events through their senses and not by the readings of thermometers and other mechanical instruments which are not fitted to the sense of animal

Those who have had experience with a well filled cellar in wister know that it is not the coldest weather as marked on the thermometer now in common use, that freezes the potatoes apples, etc., but it is that cold spell which brings with it a very damp at-

Low baremeters cross the continent from west to east every three or four days but not all of them produce that which is worthy being called storm waves. Many of these lows are entirely dry, produce no rain, the atmosphere circulating in them contains little moisture and therefore they do not affect animal life.

My effort to forecast only those lows that produce a damp atmosphere and the national weather maps make no distinction between the day and wet lows, consequently the weather maps show more lows and highs than are contained in my forecasts.

Many of these lows, produce no sensible weather changes and as an extremely large number of people depend on their senses and not on in struments they do not know, neither do they care, that a weather change has occurred.

The lower animals are much more sensible to sensible weather changes than are members of the human race. More particularly is this true of wild animals, and even tame hogs in a new country and their senses tell them of these sensible weather changes some times days in advance.




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
