Weather Bulletin.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., May 10.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 15 to 19 and will reach the Pacific coast about May 20, cross the western mountain country by close of 21st, the great central valleys from 22nd to 24th and the eastern states about the 25th.

EBB AND FLOW OF SPRINGS

Most people have noticed that before a storm springs often overflow to a greater extent than usual. Lakes also ebb and flow like the ocean but not at the same time, nor from the same cause.

high weighs more than it does in the lows and the former depresses while the latter lifts the water.

When the low barometer is approaching, its center, far away, covers the lakes and other waters that constitute the fountains from which the springs and artesian wells are fed.

When the low barometer is over these lakes and other fountains their waters rise because the pressure is less and this affects far away springs and artesian wells causing them to fall.

When a low barometer covers the upper Mississippi valley and the great lakes Texas has warm north winds. At the same time the Ohio valley will have warm south winds. The water in Lake Superior will rise and in the springs and artesian wells of Texas, lower Mississippi and Ohio valleys will fall.

As this general low barometer passes eastward the high barometer takes its place over the great lakes, the winds in Texas continue from northward but change to cool and the waters in the springs and artesian wells begin to rise because the air pressure of the country from whence come the artesian and spring waters increases by seventy pounds or more to the square foot of surface.

In the Ohio valley and eastern states the wind changes from north to south the weather cools and the spring and artesian waters come back to their normals.

Generally on the approach of my storm wave dates the water of lakes, springs and artesian wells will be depressed and as the cool wave dates come in these waters will rise again to their normals.

Sage, chief of the Iowa weather bureau, is trying to make farmers believe that civilization of land increases rainfall. Experienced agriculturists, especially those who were pioneers in breaking the prairie sod of this country, will not readily swallow that cup of Sage tea. Has the Sage of Iowa the right theory? Suppose that all the timber of every description in this country was destroyed, all the lakes, marshes, etc. drained and all the soil turned to plow land. When the rains come the water would immediately go into the soil and there could be no evaporation to supply the stems with moisture. The plow lands would all become hotbeds and the heat rising from them would dissipate the moisture being conveyed from the Gulf of Mexico, as we find to be true of the western arid plains where an abundance of moisture is passing over toward the northwest. The farmers of Iowa, in effect, are advised by their state weather bureau Sage to destroy their groves and cultivate the soil in order to get more rain. There is a drouth plant growing on the western arid plains, called the sage-bush, whose foliage is one of the most obstinate tangled textures known to botanists and it can live without water. Because of its name and peculiarities the farmers of Iowa should present their weather bureau chief with one of these plants.

Below are extracts from an article written by Grant Allen, one of the world's greatest authors, and published in the "New Science Review" of London England: "Herbert Spencer was never, in any direction, orthodox yet no man is going to produce so lasting and effect upon the thought of the future. She refused to comply, and finally a police officer was called, and told her the chicken must be put on the front platform or she must get off the car with it. The legs of the fowl were not tied; she would not put it on the platform. Then she must tie them and put it out. She objected because the fowl would freeze, and that would be cruel, the temperature being about zero. The conductor, however, insisted, and finally, by force, put her and the chicken off the car. She says she was ordered, being seated with the chicken on her lap, the chicken was quiet and did not at any time make any noise or disturbance or become a nuisance; and finally it is alleged that "at no time did the chicken conduct itself in a manner different from that quiet manner, of which the conductor was aware at the time he collected plaintiff's fare." Because of all this she wants \$5,000 damages.
