

St. Joseph, Mo., May 25 .- My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 27 to 31 and the next will reach Pacific coast about June 1st, cross the western mountain country by close of 2d, the great central valleys from 3d to 5th. and the eastern states about the 6 h.

Why shall we not find a means of harnessing that force to our machinery and quit the use of coal, wood and water powers?




