Weather Bulletin.

(Copyrighted, 1895, by W. T. Foster.)

St. JOSEPH, Mo., May 25.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 27 to 31 and the next will reach the Pacific coast about June 1st, cross the western mountain country by close of 2d, the great central valleys from 3d to 5th, and the eastern states about the 6th.

Warm waves will cross the west of Rockies country about June 1 and 7, the great central valleys 3 and 9, eastern states 5 and 11. Cool waves will cross west of Rockies country about June 4 and 10, great central valleys 6 and 12 and eastern states 8 and 14.

East of the Rocky mountains June will average colder than usual and west of the Rockies warmer. The east gulf states will have about or above normal temperature and proceeding northward the temperature departures will increase on the cold side, colder from St. Louis and Chicago toward the north-west than toward the northeast.

On the north part of the Pacific slope the temperature will average above, the temperature departures decreasing to about normal on the south part of the Pacific slope.

Rainfall of June in the southern states will be generally below normal. In the Ohio valley, the Dakotas and east of Rockies arid districts rainfall will probably be short while the north-eastern states and the middle Mississippi valleys will have full or above average rains. Florida and western Texas will be short on rainfall.

The triune power is puzzling the scientists in a manner not unlike that which theologians have experienced with the trinity in religious matters. The triune element in physics seems to have found its Darwin in Keely and its Edison in Lord Rayleigh.

Electricity, light and heat, each changeable into the other two, have long been recognized as the primary physical forces. Then heat and light have been recognized as the effects of electricity, leaving the latter as a lonely force. Some have brought in magnetism as an original force while others claim that it is only an effect of electricity. By a slow evolution of scientific ideas ether has increased its claims as one of the forces but all the while there has been an unexplainable something, a neutral force, holding the balance of power between energy and force, between positive and negative electricity, between electricity and magnetism, between the ether of outer space and the active forces of the earth. Keely turned this neutral energy into force by sympathetic vibrations as seen to exist between violin strings in harmony while Lord Rayleigh has found a means by which to extract from nitrogen a newly discovered gas which they call argon. Now we have ether, argon, electricity as a triune power with a prospect that our machinery will be hitched to this three in one force and thus be operated without the use of coal, water or steam. Should this prove a success, as now seems probable, we will have a better thing than the long sought perpetual motion. Our earth does not revolve by its own momentum, by an original impulse, as has been claimed, but by a constant force passing through it and we see the effect of this force in the natural magnet. Why shall we not find a means of harnessing that force to our machinery and quit the use of coal, wood and water powers?

When we educate our children they are capable of arriving at correct conclusions through their reasoning faculties. But when a vast amount of teachings has been crammed into their minds they are incapable of reasoning. In this academies, colleges and universities are failures, positive damages to the race. In so far as they educate they are blessings but when they take the role of teachers of a theory, as they sometimes do as to unsettled scientific, political and religious questions, they become blighting curses. the teaching is as often wrong as right all such cramming of the youthful mind should be prohibited by law.

A lack of rainfall is not the only important feature of a drouth. Evaporation often has a greater detrimental effect on vegetation than a scarcity of rainfall. This is realized more definitely when we have an average monthly rainfall and a drouth at the same time. Farmers, particularly, have noted times when only a few days after good rains vegetation suffers from drouth. In reference to this matter of evaporation the weather records are very deficient and without taking it into account long range forecasts of rainfall can never be perfected. Excessive rains are recorded but not excessive evaporations and therefore in the records the rainfall often goes twice as far above the average as it can go below and this makes the record show that rainfall goes below the average twice as often as it goes above.

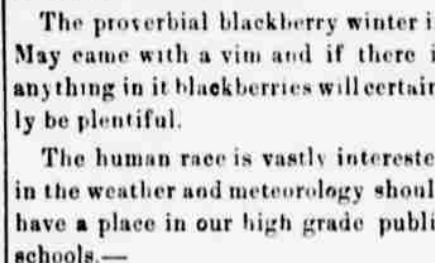
Evaporation often makes the rainfall very much less than nothing but this fact never enters into the records. This unbalances the records and makes them unreliable as a test of planetary influences. To overcome this deficiency the minus rainfall must include evaporation and this will place the averages so that plus rainfall will occur in the records as often as minus.

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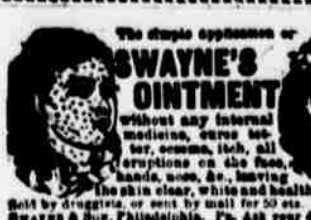
