Supervisors' Proceedings.

At a meeting of the board of supervisors of Webster county, Neb., held in Red Cloud, commencing June 11, 1895, sitting as a board of equalization, the following members were present: A. H. Hoffman, chm., Watt, Kindscher, Spracher, Schultz, Hurd, Hummel, Crabill, McCall, Broomfield, Lewis, Best.
 Motion to adjourn to meet at 1 p. m. carried.
 June 11, 1 p. m., board met pursuant to adjournment, A. H. Hoffman chm. All members present except Hill and Cather.
 Chairman appointed the following committees on equalization:
 Committee on Real Estate—McCall, Best, Lewis, Spracher.
 Villages and Cities—Kort, Richardson, Hummel, Broomfield.
 Personal in County—Kindscher, Cox, Lewis, Schultz.
 Personal Cities and Villages—Watt, Crabill, Hurd, Hill.
 Whereupon the committee proceeded to examine and review the assessment books and blanks.
 Moved and carried that board adjourn to meet tomorrow at 9 a. m.
 June 12, 9 a. m., board met, Hoffman chairman, 15 members present.
 Now comes J. S. Gilham, in behalf of the city of Red Cloud, and represents to the board that C. F. Cather, the member of the board, is absent from the city and leaving the city without representation, and asks the board to allow the city to have some one from the city to represent them on the board.

Motion made by Hummel and seconded that city be entitled to representation in the interest of the city of Red Cloud during the meeting of the board. Carried.
 Now comes R. B. Fulton and presents the following:
 To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

I, W. F. West, city clerk, hereby certify that at the meeting of June 4, of the city board of equalization, the following record appears: "Mayor appointed Ald. Fulton to represent city of Red Cloud on the board of equalization of Webster county, to meet on 11th day of June, 1895."—W. F. West, City Clerk.
 Moved and carried that the county attorney be called in to give his opinion regarding the admitting of Fulton as a representative of city on board of equalization.
 County Attorney McNeny rendered opinion that board had no authority to grant Fulton's petition. Board then adjourned to 1 p. m.
 Reassembled at 1 p. m., Hoffman in chair, 16 members present.
 After considerable discussion the board decided that Fulton could sit on the board by filing his bond and presenting his certificate of appointment. Ayes and nays being called for, the vote stood:
 Ayes—Spracher, Laird, Kort, Hummel, Crabill, Broomfield, Best, Hoffman—8.
 Nays—Watt, Schultz, Hurd, Hill, Cox, McCall, Lewis—7.
 Motion carried.
 Board proceeded to examine assessors' books and blanks.
 Board adjourned, to meet Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.
