TO SILVER DEMOCRATS.

A National Conference Called for Wash-Ington August 14 to Plas Work.

MEMPINS, Tenn., June 27.-Immediately after the adjournment of the recent silver convention in this city, a number of leading Democrats outlined plans for an organization of free silver men within the Democratic party for the purpose of carrying on the silver campaign within party lines. As a result of this meeting the following address has been sent to Democratic leaders throughout the

Country:
Soon after the adjournment of the silver convention held in this city on the 12th and 13th inst., many Democrats representing several states of the Union held a meeting here for the pur-pose of considering the best methods of securing the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold into full legal tender money at ultimate re-demption at the ratio of 16 to 1, without regard to the financial policy of other-countries, and it was unanimousby agreed that as the confident opinion of that conference:

1. That the only hope of securing

the free and unlimited coinage of silver at idito I is through the action of the Democratic party.

2. That a large majority of the Democratic party of the country and a very large majority of the people of the United States, irrespective of party, favor such coinage.

3. That the success of the Democratic party in the campaign of 1896 largely, if not wholly, depends on the earnest

and active advocacy of the free and unlimited coinage of silver.

4. That a thorough organization of the Democrats of the several states who favor the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold on terms of equality at 16 to I is a necessary equality at 16 to 1 is a necessary and proper means of controlling the action or the national Democratic convention of 1896 upon this vitally important question.

That in order to avoid friction and the complaint of such Democrats as oppose the free coinage of silver, we will not invoke the regular machinery of the party whose duty it is to act for the whole party without regard to differences of opinion upon a single ques-

Therefore, we, the undersigned, were appointed a committee to take such steps as may be necessary national organizathorough tion of silver Demograts and for that purpose we respectfully invite you to neet us at Washington D. 

JALLS FOR PARTY SENTIMENT ON SILVER IN MISSOURI.

HE ISSUES AN ADDRESS.

The State Democratic Committee Will Be Again Convened if the Leaders Really Desire It-The Past Posttion of the Members Defined -Asks for Immediate

Replies to the Letter.

St. Louis, Mo., June 27.—Chairman 2. C. Maffitt of the Democratic state tentral committee has mailed to each Democratic county chairman in Missouri an address, of which the followng is a part: "Your state Democratic sommittee, having noted through the public press that some enthusiasts in ochalf of the free, unlimited and unconditional coinage of silver at the atio of 16 to 1 were clamorous for a convention of the Democratic party n this state for the purpose of riving expression to sentiment upon hat, to the exclusion of all other important articles of the Demoratic creed, convened on the 1st day of June, with the view of canvassing the policy, propriety and wisdom of sommitting the party by its action to such an unusual and unprecedented project. Upon the assembling of the full committee, the general phase of the subject was considered and thoroughly sanvassed, the argument for and against having been patiently heard and carefully and dispassionately weighed. The judgment of the comnittee was registered against the callong of a convention by the decisive rote of 10 to 5. It is due, alike to this committee and to you, in benalf of the good of the party, to briefly putline the reasons which influenced it in deciding against such a convention, as well as some of the more important views urged in its favor, which were considered by the committee."

The chairman then gives as the reaurpose of formulating a declaration of beliefs solely upon a single one of the national issues might be justly construed as an abandonment of all others; that it would create schisms, party ostracism and anarchy; that neither tradition nor usage afforded a precedent for a convention to predelare upon any subject which must be least with by a regular convention hat puts forth a declaration of priniples for its party candidates; that he committee did not feel clothed with the power to call such a conven-

In closing, the address says: "It was rgued that if such a convention declared in favor of the free, unlimited and unconditional coinage of silver at 6 to 1, it would give an impetus to that entiment in other states and help on he cause. The result of the election ollowing admonishes us that we must e careful to be strong at home before we lend strength to our neighbors. It was argued that by a timely declara-ion upon the silver question and in the ight way, we might be able to reclaim hose who had strayed away from he fold into the Populist party. t was then answered that if we commit the Democratic party this single issue, the one very conpicuous in the Populist platform, night not that party, without arro-ance, claim that it had been recruited y the accession of the Democratic arty of this state? It is an argument nat cuts two ways. And now, notithstanding the previous desision of his committee, I, as its executive ofcer, will again convene it if it be the sense of the party expressed through he members of the county committees hat a state convention ought to be salled to consider the special question

before indicated.

"Your committee at its former meetng was actuated by a sense of duty and devotion to the Democratic party, and here presents you-possessed of he same sacred trust—some of the ceasons which influenced its decision not to call an extraordinary conven-

"Its motives have been assailed and mpugned. It has been urged to reconrene and reconsider its action. And low, notwithstanding the previous desision of this committee, I, as its exective officer, will again convene it if it be the sense of the party expressed sounty committees that a state sonvention ought to be called co consider the question before in-licated. The sources demanding licated. The sources demanding convention insist that it can only be regular through the call of the state committee; and should the state committee determine to call a convenion upon again assembling, impressed as it is so strongly with its want of authority to do so, it feels the necessity for the justification of its action in the majority vote of the regularly constituted officers of the party in each county of the state. If, therefore, it s the desire of your committee that further action be taken by the state sentral committee, please have your committee indicate its pleasure and transmit the same to this committee on the inclosed blank in the manner therein specified."
