OMAHA'S RIVAL POLICE BOARDS AGREE TO A LEGAL CONTEST.

THE OLD BOARD STAYS IN.

The Threatened Conflict Between the Adherents of the Two Commissions Averted by a Conference—The Old Board Declines Its Position—Kansas City A. P. A.'s Offer Aid.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 15.—The A. P. A. commission convened at 11 o'clock in rooms reserved for their use by the city council. The quarters were crowded by a motley gathering of probably 200 sympathizers.

After an animated discussion, the old fire and police commission refusing any compromise except on the basis of permitting the supreme court to pass on the situation, the A. P. A. commission consented and it was agreed that the old commission should continue to conduct the offices of the city until a decision should be rendered in the case.

The old commission defines its position now thus: "We believe we are the only lawful board of police and fire commissioners of Omaha and in the language of Judge Hoge we have the right to remain peacefully in possession and to exercise the functions of said office until otherwise ordered in a proper legal proceeding."

THE GOLD RESERVE. Heavy Withdrawals for Export to Europe Are Immediately Replaced.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—A telegram was received at the treasury department from Assistant United States Treasurer Jordan at New York, stating that \$900,000 in gold had been withdrawn for export to Europe.
