Heavy Withdrawals for Export to Europe Are Immediately Replaced.

Washington, Aug. 15 -A telegram was received at the treasury department from Assistant United States
Treasurer Jordan at New York, stating that \$900,000 in gold had been withdrawn for export to Europe. This was followed in a few minutes by another, stating that the Morgan syndicate had deposited in gold in exchange for legal tenders \$1,346,000, which leaves the gold reserve at the close of the day's t the day's business \$101,833,715. General Headquarters in the Field, Montompolo, July 31.—Dear Sir: The evolution is most powerful in Santisgo de Cuba and in Camaguey; every sattle so far has been a triumph for the liberators of this country. STARTED FOR KU CHENG.

American and British Officials Are En Route to That Place to Investigate. SHANGHAI, Aug. 15 .- Mr. Mansfield, the acting British consul at Foo Chow; Mr. Allen, the British vice consul at Padoga island; "Colonel J. Courtney Hickson, the United States consul at Foo Chow; Messrs. Banister and Gregory, and one of the lieut ants of the

United States cruiser Detroit, will start from Foo Chow for Ku Cheng, the cene of the recent massacres, as soon as possible in order to make a com-plete inquiry into the matter. The consular party will be escorted by a detachment of 100 Chinese troops, the viceroy having refused to allow an escort of foreign soldiers or marines to accompany them.

Colored Baptists to Help Waller. WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 .- Hon. John M. Langston addressed the Washington conference of the colored Baptist church on the imprisonment of exconsul Waller. At the conclusion of his remarks a resolution was passed protesting against the treatment re-ceived by Mr. Waller, and a pledge was made to bring the matter to the attention of various Baptist congregations, in order to provide money for the assistance of Mr. Waller's family.
