WHEREAS, The state of Nebraska was admit ted into the Union in the year 1867 and the fees and salaries of most of the officers were established at that time, and that the mints of the United States were at that time open to the free coinage of both gold and silver, the fees and salarles were thereupon established on that basis, and were paid by the taxpayers on their relative value of their productions and labor

WHEREAS, We believe the demonstization of silver in 1873, to be the leading cause of this declination in the value of production and labor, and has been the sole cause of the appreciation of money, and

WHEREAS. We believe in equal privileges for all and special privileges for none, and
