"ON THE OCEAN WAVE."

Ralph Pope, U. S. Naval Cadet, Furnishes The Chief With an Interesting Letter of His Voyage to Eastern Cities, on Board the U. S. Naval Ship Monongahela.

(SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE.)

U. S. SHIP MONONGAHELA, Aug. 25, 1895.

FRIEND HOMER:—Now while on the way back to Annapolis, I have time to make good my promise to write to THE CHIEF, yet I scarcely know where to begin. I might tell you something of the Naval Academy, our voyage across the Atlantic with storm, and that desire to stop, for a few minutes, the rolling and pitching of the ship, which was experience enough for the first week; the whales, flying and other species of fish seen; the capturing of a shark, which was very exciting fun: It was during a calm while near the Saragozza sea and on the other side of the Tropic of Cancer that a bluejacket caught him on a hook, two ropes were then put around his body, was shot twice and hoisted on board, of course we kept at the other end of the line as the shark was far from dead, but soon expired. He was an ugly looking fellow and his razor like teeth could easily destroy anything that they once got hold of.

When anchored in Hampton Roads the cadets were permitted to visit Fortress Monroe and a neighboring summer resort and of course all had to look at the water where the Monitor and Merrimac fought. The Monongahela is now anchored at the mouth of the Potomac and will arrive at Annapolis on the 28th inst.

But I must tell you of Maderia. As soon as the ship was anchored in the roadstead in front of Funchal, Maderia, we were surrounded by bumboats and other smaller boats containing small naked, dark colored boys, who hailed us with "Heave, I dive." The cadets threw several small pieces of money into the water and it was amusing to see them dive for them, although the water was seventy-five fathoms deep, the boys never failed to get the coin before it had sunk too far. The bumboat men had fruit and various small things for sale and succeeded in selling several silver rings made of pewter and some gold (?) ones. Maderia is about one half the size of Webster county. Funchal, its principal town containing about 25,000 people, is situated on the mountain side and reaches to the water's edge. The mountains shut out all the moisture laden winds from the northeast but they have no difficulty in irrigating the soil.

Our party ascended the mountain on a train, over a cog road similar to the one on Pike's Peak, Col. While moving slowly up the mountain one can enjoy the fine scenery and tropical verdure of Maderia. In many places two crops were growing on the same ground. The side of the mountain has been converted into an amphitheatre, on these benches may be seen gardens of many kinds of vegetables, groves of fig, orange, banana, etc. and more than all else vineyards of grapes which are the principal product of the island and from which a very large quantity of wine is made. The largest grain fields contain not more than one quarter of an acre of land. A little farther up, and we are on the edge of a deep canon, at the bottom of which is a brook, the waterfalls, tropical flowers, rocks and ferns of many kinds make this an ideal spot for the naturalist.

We ascend only to the clouds, from here a fine view of the city and harbor may be had. In the descent we deserted the train for a vehicle none of us had seen before, a basket on runners somewhat resembling the sledge of the Esquimaux, the attraction of gravitation with a Dago on behind to guide the sled was all that was needed. The road like the streets of the city was paved with small smooth stones from the seashore, was very narrow and had stone buildings or a stone wall on both sides so that there was no danger of leaving it and the guide takes good care that you do not get a chance to break it down. The smoothness of the pavement and the many sharp turns make the descent seem dangerous and when going at a speed of 20 miles an hour, a sharp angle appeared ahead. I turned to see if the guide had fallen off and was ordered to sit still, yet after getting your breath a little farther down, you enjoy the descent and soon reach the lower part of the city.

I took supper in a Portuguese hotel, got on very well until I ordered ice cream and the waiter brought a plate of fish. Very few speak English. Only the children of rich parents go to school and all the boys have to enter the army at a very early age. They have a good love of money and seem to think all foreigners have plenty. The richer class take their afternoon drive in a sled covered with a canopy and resembling a bus on runners, this is drawn by a pair of red oxen, the coachman walking at their side. I did not see but one carriage and team of horses while on the island. In the brook which runs through the city, one may, at the bottom of the ravine fifty feet below the streets, see the washerwomen at work, troubling themselves about the supply of water; washing the clothes on one of numerous boulders and spreading them

on other stones to dry. Anything to be carried is always placed on the head. If a single person wishes to take a ride he usually takes a palanquin. The buildings are made of stone, whitewashed on the exterior and roofed with tiling. The streets are very narrow through the buildings are not more than two or three stories high. The Portuguese are an obliging people and always friendly to Americans.

WHAT THEY SAY OF THE NEXT DISTRICT JUDGE.

Red Cloud turned out en masse to congratulate James McNeny upon his nomination for district judge. The event took place Saturday evening last. When Mr. McNeny and family were enjoying the evening at home, there came a noise as of a vast multitude approaching. There was beating of drums and blowing of horns, and above the din came the clarion of Jim Gilham and Ran McNitt, calling boys in. Red Cloud came in force. Everybody came to offer honors, and Judge McNeny, whose whiskers cast a radiance like the setting sun, offered them a royal welcome. Jim Gilham in a well-worded speech offered the feelings of the crowd, and they cheered and cheered. Judge McNeny responded. People who are betting on McNeny's election in Red Cloud haven't got any money, but they have got a warm spot in their heart for their candidate. It is very clear that Mr. McNeny stands well at home.—Adams County Democrat.

James McNeny, a well qualified lawyer of Webster county, has been nominated by the republicans to fill the exalted position of judge of the 10th judicial district of Nebraska. The district comprises six counties, including Adams, Franklin, Harlan, Kearney, Phelps and Webster. The population of the district according to the census of 1890 is 70,294. The total congressional vote in 1894 was 13,827. Using the congressional vote as a basis, we find the fusion plurality in 1890 to be 3,718, and in 1892, 1,281; in 1894 a republican plurality of 317. The changes made in favor of the republicans in 1892 was 2,437 and in 1894, 964. The total change in favor of the republicans in 1892 and 1894 aggregated 3,401.—Alma Record.

McNeny of Red Cloud will be the next judge of the Tenth district.—McCook Tribune.

A well posted gentleman from Red Cloud gives it as his opinion that James McNeny will carry Webster county with a whoop. He says what makes the opposition to McNeny look so large and formidable is that a few people who are opposed to him make more noise than his friends deem it necessary to make for him.—Hastings Republican.

He came to Nebraska in the seventies and located at Red Cloud, when it was only a speck on the earth, so that after twenty years' law practice in Nebraska, Mr. McNeny is by no means a spring chicken. His name appears frequently in cases before the state supreme court and U. S. Federal court. The Democrat congratulates Mr. McNeny upon his good fortune in receiving the nomination.—Adams County Democrat.
