It was a very weak admission for a man like Allen to make, especially while holding the responsible position of United States senator. If a man will disregard his oath in war what will he do in peace. He evidently talked more than he meant to. It was, to say the least, a great admission to make before the old soldiers who fought in a cause that was dearer to them than life.

The republican candidate for district judge, Hon. Jas. McNeny of this city, who has been in active practice for twenty years in this city and county, is one of the brainiest lawyers in the state and will carry with him a large following from every political party. It would be a difficult task, however, for a lawyer who has been active not to have made some enemies who are presently camping on his trail, but THE CHIEF believes that withal the persistency of some of his enemies that he will have an overwhelming majority from the fact that he has the ability to preside over the high office for which he has been nominated.
