THE MILLS OF THE GODS

GRIND SLOW BUT EXCEEDING FINE.

And, with the Aid of the Fire Fiend, Our Red Cloud Roller Mills Were Ground to Earth in One Mass of Ashes and Cinders.

On last Monday evening, just as the sun had sunk beneath the western hills, a bright light sprang up with sudden fierceness and spread its brightness over the canopy of heaven, in the vicinity of the Red Cloud Flouring Mills. The flames vied with each other in lapping their serpentine tongues over, around, and upon every vulnerable portion of the mill, with seeming determination to swallow it up in one grand vortex of flaming liquid. The seething and hissing of the flames were majestic as they rapidly spread forth their wings of destruction, and in sixty minutes after the fiery elements fastened their fangs upon the structure, the \$65,000 flouring mill was razed to mother earth, nothing left to tell the tale except a mass of ruins and the basement upon which the building stood.

How the fire originated is not known, but the flames were first noticed in the topmost story by Mr. John Doyle's boy while milking, and, giving the alarm, he drew out the people living in that vicinity, who did their utmost to save the property, but to no effect, the mill being dry as tinder and filled with inflammable material, soon capitulated to the fiery elements.

The mill was located two miles southwest of the city on the Republican river, and was erected about nine years ago by Kenyon Skeen, I. Friable, R. D. Jones and others, and was equipped with the finest milling machinery obtainable. In addition to the mill was a large elevator and the electrical lighting plant which furnished the city of Red Cloud with light. The elevator contained 3200 bushels of wheat, 2400 bushels belonging to Geo. W. Lindsey, valued at about \$1500; 600 bushels belonging to George Maynard, valued at about \$400, and about 200 bushels belonging to Templeton & Guthrie, which firm had just leased the mill. There was no insurance on the wheat and therefore it was a total loss.

Anthony Schaefer had just loaded a car of beets on the track in front of the mill, and the car and beets were both burned.

The electric light plant cost about \$12000, the elevator and mill with contents about \$65000.

At the time of the fire the mill was being put in shape to be run by the firm of Templeton & Guthrie of Superior, who had leased it for a number of years. The dyke which had been washed out by the spring freshet was being put back in and everything looked favorable to the resumption of the milling business in good shape before the end of the week, and our people felt jubilant over the matter, but the old proverb that "man proposes and God disposes" was only repeated.

Naturally enough our people feel the blow because it destroys one of the best and most substantial enterprises in Red Cloud, one which will take considerable money to replace. We have not learned the amount of insurance, but it will not cover the loss whatever it may be, as the mill is a total loss.

The Chief fondly hopes that efforts will be made to replace the mill at an early day.

The Argus has always had the credit of being fair if nothing more with its news, but its account of the Naponee-Blue Hill ball game at Red Cloud last week was a shame to the town and a blot of very large size on the truthfulness of the paper. In the first place the Naponee players are regularly organized and had the same men they have been playing all season, all living at Naponee except one, while Red Cloud had but two players from their own town, bringing the other seven from Blue Hill. Then the umpire was as fair as an umpire could be, if anything giving the Blue Hill fellows all doubts. As to the pitchers, it was generally conceded that Naponee's was the best although he only fanned out one man while Blue Hill's pitcher fanned two. It was the superb fielding of the latter club that won the game. It was a rank injustice to the Naponee boys who are gentlemen and play good ball as well as to the readers of the Argus to print such an account. Such a "base lie." The ball players of Red Cloud should be ashamed of themselves, too, that they are not able to scare up but two men in the whole town that can play ball. In conversation with the captain of the Naponee club before the game he said, "We came down to play Red Cloud but now that they have rung in Blue Hill on us we expect to be beaten but we will do the best we can." The Argus and Nation both had accurate accounts of the game, but such lies as the Argus sprung on us will certainly not help much in securing clubs from elsewhere to play in Red Cloud.
