The Red Cloud mills, that had been leased by Templeton & Guthrie, were destroyed by fire last evening between 7 and 8 o'clock. The loss is total and included the Red Cloud electric light power house and plant adjoining the mill. Templeton & Guthrie had leased the mill for a term of years and expected to do their first grinding Thursday and had arranged to run on full time and to the utmost capacity of the plant. The loss to them is more severe in a reasonable prospect for doing a good business than in the actual property destroyed, as they had as yet no wheat in the mill and only one car on the siding, which was destroyed. Several additional cars were on the track at the station but fortunately had not been pushed in on the siding. How the fire originated is unknown.—Superior Journal.
