St. JOHEPH, Mo., Nov. 30.-My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from the December 4th to 8th and the next will reach the Pacific coast about December brations of a tuning fork. 9, cross the west of Rockies country by close of 10th, great central valleys from 11th to 13th, eastern states 14th.

This disturbance will strike the Pacific coast farther north than is usual for this month, and the tempera ure on the Pacific coast will go unusua'ly bigh.

As it moves eastward it will probably incline southward and pass out to soa on the mid-Atlantic coast.

The warm wave will cross the west of Rockies country about 9th, great central valleys 11, castern states 13th. Cool wave will cross the west of Rockies country about 12th, great central valleys 14th, eastern states

Not much rain may be expected west of the Mississippi from this disturbance. Some snow probable with the last part of the storm. Most Most rain and snow will probably fall on Atlantic coast.

As has been explained, the tuning fork, the hern, stringed instruments, and vibrating tongues of brass were used in decomposing water for the old Keely ferce, and the same are used to generate the new force,

But this new force appears to be drawn from space without decompos ing anything. Keely's idea is that he draws from space and again sends out the pure ether, the movements of which constitute this newly discovered wonder. Mayon he decomposes
