THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE.

meets at the Capital City of Webster County and Transacts Business.—Chairman Crabill, Presiding.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Resolved that the county clerk be authorized to make a new numerical index and the county pay for same at the rate of five cents per line or transfer. Adopted.

Petition from school district No. 74, read and on motion was referred to a committee and the committee to report at this meeting. Chair appointed as said committee Watt, Kort and Spracher.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors: We the undersigned board of education of school district 74 of Webster county, Nebraska, respectfully request you on behalf of the legal voters and taxpayers of Dist. No. 47 to order the county treasurer not to collect the bond tax of 25 mills levied by you last July on said Dist. No. 74, but to collect only five mills, being sufficient to pay interest on bonds on school district No. 74, and to provide a small sinking fund as the district desires to refund said bonds to the amount of \$3,000 due in the fall of 1896.

Signed by forty-nine names. The sheriff was ordered to get one-half dozen quilts for the jail.

Committee on court house, jail and grounds were instructed to inspect and report on sidewalk in front of jail.

Adjourned to meet Friday morning.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Official bonds. Committee on settlement with clerk recommended the approval of the third quarterly report of clerk. Moved and carried that the report of the committee be approved.

Committee on settlement with county superintendent recommend the adoption of the report.

The special committee on school bond in district No. 74 reported as follows: To the Board of Supervisors:

Your committee in the matter of the petition from school district 74 would recommend that the county treasurer be authorized to reduce the bond levy for the year 1895 to ten ten mills provided school district No. 74 will pay him for the necessary work.

J. F. Watt reported that he had disposed of all Guide Rock bridge material to various road districts and sold 400 feet to Guide Rock township.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

In the matter of the taxes of Dr. Weggman for the years '87 and '88, moved that a committee of two be appointed to investigate. Kort and Broomfield were appointed as such committee.

Watt offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That the board ought to reconsider the action taken in case of Charlotte Leigh on erroneous assessment as parties want to redeem the land but are unwilling to pay the amount standing against them.

It was moved and seconded that the treasurer be ordered to reduce the same 50 per cent. Carried.

SATURDAY SESSION.

Committee on Dr. Weggman complaint reported as follows:

We, your committee appointed to look up C. Weggman's taxes for 1887-8 and that he has paid taxes for 1888 on property in Potsdam, but not in Batin.

Moved and carried that the board take no further action on the personal taxes of Dr. C. Weggman for the years 1887 and 1888.

Claim of A. F. Karnes and John Heinrich, committee reported cutting the claim to \$8, lost.

The claim was then ordered returned for correction.

Adjourned to January 6, 1896.
