EDITORIAL NOTES.

The cold blooded murder of Armenians still goes on by the Turkish people.

DURING the last election Kansas rolled up 82,000 majority for the republican ticket.

The DeWitt County News, published at Clinton, Illinois, is a new paper established at that place. It is a fine country paper and will be a complete success.

CONGRESS is in session. Both houses are republican and we feel certain that remedial legislation will at once be enacted for the prevention of the further going into debt by the government.

MANY cities of the country are desirous of having the national republican convention held therein. It strikes us Chicago is about the right sized town for so large a convention to take place in.

CZAR REED has again become prominent by being unanimously chosen as speaker of the national house of representatives. Tom Reed is one of America's brainiest statesmen. His rulings on counting a quorum will go rattling down the ages as a master stroke of political wisdom.

THE house and senate have put their feet down vigorously for sustaining the Monroe Doctrine and the recognition of Cuba. This is at wide variance with President Cleveland's weak kneed policy of asking John Bull what he thinks about it everytime the question comes up.

The President's Message.

The curiosity of the country will be gratified this morning by the printing of many millions of copies of the president's message in the daily newspapers of the land. Those that expected much will be disappointed. Mr. Cleveland does not consider the time ripe to take the people into his confidence. The great part of the document this year is a labored attempt to make us believe that the inglorious financial career of Mr. Cleveland's administration was not the fault of the democratic monkeying with the tariff, but the fault of congress in the seventies, which, instead of wiping out the greenback currency of the country and returning perhaps to the old wildcat system of paper money, authorized the continued reissue of treasury notes or legal tender, and provided a gold reserve of a hundred million of dollars to guarantee the redemption of such of them as should be presented at the treasury counter, in gold.

It is perhaps a sublime spectacle, but it is not business, and doubtless Grover knows as well as any of us that there would not have been the constant withdrawals of gold from the reserve had not the paralyzing seadew of democratic revenue legislation immediately covered the land.

The fact that under republican rule with republican credit and republican revenues, the government was never in any embarrassment, but easily replenished the reserve from its revenues in gold without thinking of issuing bonds, is a complete refutation of his painfully built argument.

He recommends the issue of \$300,000,000 more bonds for the redemption of the greenback currency, under the pretense that if the treasury notes were only cancelled and gotten out of the way they would stop "withdrawing gold" from the reserve.

However, no one expected that Mr. Cleveland was the man to acknowledge out and out the utter failure of his administration in the matter of the national revenues and currency.

The first part of the message is taken up with our foreign relations. Here Mr. Cleveland expends a good many words in saying nothing. He is absolutely non-committal as to his policy.

He discusses the Waller case, but is careful, if he knows anything about the merits of it, to conceal that knowledge.

In the Venezuela case he tells us about that note he sent to Silasbury, but declares that it will not be answered.

In his account of his dealings with Hawaii he takes a very different stand from that he assumes in the dealings with France in the Waller case. He would not allow that an American citizen could be deprived of life, property and liberty by a court-martial in Hawaii for bearing arms against the government, but he isn't at all certain that in the Waller case, in which France was merely invading a country in which an American citizen was a resident, that it wasn't perfectly proper to court martial him and sentence him to twenty years penal servitude.

The message speaks of the insurrection in Cuba without saying anything.

The message says nothing about the burning question of the deficit in the national treasury. It makes, consequently, no recommendations on that score. It thus dodges the all absorbing question of the hour. It winds up with an elaborate but altogether useless argument against free coinage.

In short the document is remarkable for what it does not say, and in striking contrast to the corresponding message sent in to congress eight years ago by the same president.
