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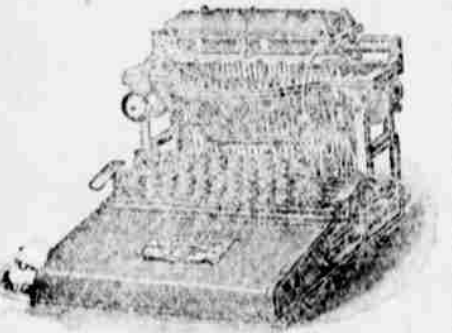

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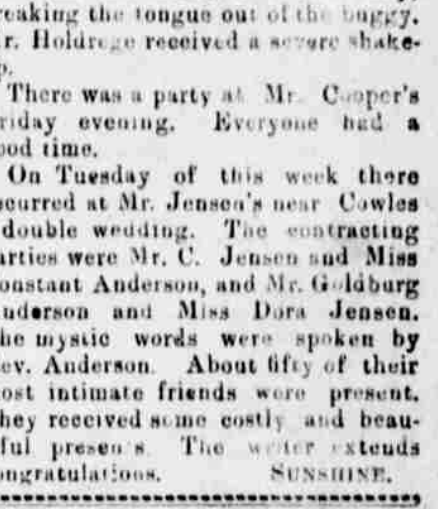
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Henry Lee was nearly killed by being run over by a horse Sunday night.
