Thomas Leigh was born April 24.

830, in Plymouth, Devonshire, England. departed this life January 18, 1896, at the age of 65 years, 8 months, and 24 days. He was a son of Richard and Elizabeth Leigh, also natives of England, and in 1847, with his parents, came to the United States, landing at New York, and coming direct to Ontonogan county, Michigan; here the subject of our sketch grew to manhood, receiving a limited education. He was engaged in various occupations, and had many thrilling experiences and dangerous adventures; he was first engaged in the saw mill business, later in clearing and farming, and still later in the employ of Uncle Sam as mail carrier, being the first in that part of the state. In January, 1866, he moved to Kankakee county.
