While they did not get a full crop this year, still they have raised more than enough to do them and thousands of bushels of corn are going to market every day, and piles of corn are stacked up on the ground all over the country. The people are as a rule healthy, hearty, industrious and contented and hog cholera is unknown, and their native grasses will keep their stock in a thriving condition the greater part of the year when not covered with snow and it is reported that cattle live to so great an age that their horns are not long enough for the wrinkles to grow upon. Alfalfa grows to perfection. We saw several fields that were sown last spring that had been cut three times, and it makes the choicest quality of hay for all kinds of stock including hay. Peaches, cherries, plums and mulberries are grown in abundance, while apples do not do so well, yet all that have put out apple trees and taken care of them are reaping their reward with choice apples. We met many former Nodaway county people while there. They all have good farms with comfortable houses, and have no thoughts of changing their location. Among the former Nodaway county people we met while there were John and Harvey Merrill, Chas. Munger and son, and Miss Doty, an accomplished young lady from Ornsburg, who at present is seeking health and pleasure in Webster county, Nebraska. We also met Em Wood at Lebanon, also Rev. L. V. Morton of the same place. He is now retired and assists Mr. Wood in the hardware line. This article would appear incomplete if we should fail to mention the opportunity for sportsmen. The cunning coyote and the fleet footed jack rabbit of which that country abounds will entertain the aimed to the fullest extent. 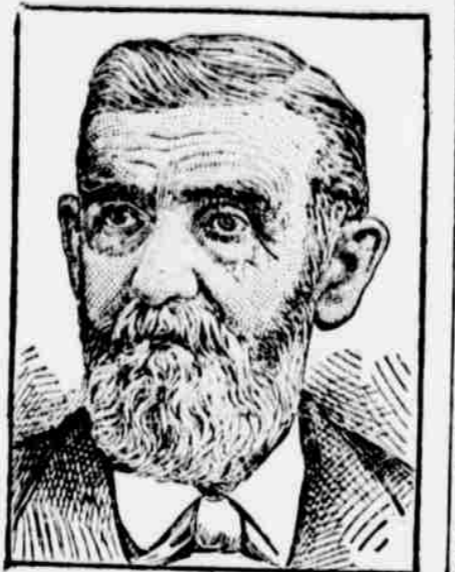

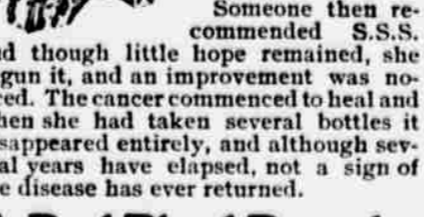
