**An Old Landmark.**  
In all probability there does not exist in Webster county another as unique character as Uncle Tommy Reed, who is eighty-eight years of age, and probably the oldest man in the county. He was born in 1808, in Boston, Mass., and, when but a lad, chose the life of a sailor, shipping as cabin boy on a merchant man—in those days, about the swiftest craft that sailed the blue waters of the Atlantic. For twenty years he plied the seas for a livelihood, visiting every nook and corner of the foot-stool. He has visited all the principal cities of Europe, Asia, Africa, and the Americas, and relates many interesting stories in regard to the countries of the east.  
Sometime in the 40's he started out and traversed the great unknown west. He took part in many of the hard fought Indian wars, acting as interpreter for the government. He can speak fluently several Indian languages, principally that of the Sioux. His stories of those memorable events are exceedingly interesting.

He located in this county about the 70's, and when THE CHIEF was first printed, he paid \$5 for one of the first copies and has remained a loyal patron ever since. Uncle Tommy, although bent by the infirmities of more than four score years, yet bears promise of many more years of usefulness. Few men have had the experience that has come to him in all parts of the earth. ### FULLY ORGANIZED.

#### The Red Cloud Commercial Club Meets in Judge Duffy's Office and Forms a Complete Organization.

#### Is Now Ready For Business in the Interest of Red Cloud.

In response to a popular sentiment, a large number of Red Cloud business men and citizens met in Judge Duffy's office last Wednesday evening, for the purpose of completing the organization of the club started a few days ago. Owing to the fact that Mr. A. Hadell had handed in his resignation as president of the former club, the committee thought it expedient to call another meeting and re-elect officers for the club on a different basis. Mr. Hadell, while willing to do all in his power to help Red Cloud forge to the front, thought that it would not be advisable for him to neglect his own business to do so, and therefore resigned to take effect at once. In consequence, the committee on organization called the meeting last Wednesday night for that purpose.

The meeting was called to order by Robt. T. Potter; O. C. Bell was called to the chair, and Mr. Potter was chosen secretary pro tem. On motion, the body resolved itself into a Commercial Club and proceeded to the election of officers, with the following results:

What the city needs is hot life and no drones in the hive. Every man in Red Cloud that can do so ought to enroll his name on the Club records and become an earnest worker in the promotion of the city's welfare. The club has under consideration the re-establishment of the creamery in this city, a thing most to be desired. They are preparing to send some specimens of steuco to Topeka for examination, with a view to having same developed in our midst. They have in view the establishment of a brick hotel in the city and many more projects that can be brought here, provided that the citizens take hold of the enterprises as they should.

Do you desire to help the city? If so, get your shoulder to the wheel, and do so without further equivocating. It will take united action to accomplish any of these projects.

#### BY-LAWS.

Art. 1. This organization shall be known as the Red Cloud Commercial Club.  
Art. 2. The object of this organization is to secure the united efforts of the business men of Red Cloud in advancing the welfare and material interests of our city.  
Art. 3. The membership of this organization shall consist of all persons who sign the by-laws of this order, and pay into its treasury the sum of one dollar.  
Art. 4. At any regular or called meeting of this organization, seven persons, not including the president and secretary, shall constitute a quorum.  
Art. 5. The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. They shall hold their respective offices for the term of one year, or until their successors shall have been elected.  
Art. 6. There shall be an advisory board, whose duty it shall be to advise the officer and organization on any and all matters which may come before them for consideration; such advisory board shall consist of twenty-five members of this organization.

Art. 7. The executive board of this organization shall consist of five persons. The president and secretary shall be ex officio members of the executive board. They shall hold their office for the term of one year.  
Art. 8. All members in good standing shall be allowed to participate in the deliberations of this organization.  
Art. 9. The meetings of this Club shall be held in the evening of the first Friday of each month, but meetings may be held at other times when, in the opinion of the president or a majority of the executive board, such meeting shall be deemed necessary.

Art. 10. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings of the Club; in his absence, the vice president shall preside; in the absence of both, the chairman of the executive board shall preside. All orders drawn from the treasurer shall be countersigned by the president. The secretary shall make and preserve a record of all the business transacted by this Club at its meetings; collect the dues that shall be assessed against the members hereof; said record shall be evidence of the standing of each member of the Club; the secretary shall pay over all moneys so collected by him to the treasurer of the Club. No money shall be paid out by said treasurer, except upon order duly signed by the secretary and countersigned by the president of the Club, and all orders shall state fully for what purpose they were drawn.

Art. 11. The treasurer shall keep the funds of this Club, and no money shall be paid out by him except upon order duly signed and countersigned by the secretary and president of the Club.  
Art. 12. The executive board shall have full power to transact any and all business brought before them, which, in the opinion of a majority of the members of the board, does not require action by a meeting of the Club, but all business so transacted shall be reported to the Club at the ensuing regular meeting.
