#### SENTINEL PRAIRIE, Mo., Feb. 20, '96.

TO THE CHIEF:—I was glad to hear from our old neighbor John Wilhelmson, in a recent number of THE CHIEF. I am always glad to hear from old Red Clouders, especially refugees; would like to hear from Wm. Gates, Vint Williams, Jake Miller, or Wes Street. Write a good letter boys, and we can thus keep in touch. I am glad Red Cloud is waking up and proposes to pull together, as I hope to yet become a resident of Webster county, although, like Mr. Wilhelmson, I am very comfortably located here, but I lived in or near Red Cloud too long to be easily weaned away. I have two good farms here, either or both of which I would exchange for good Webster county lands, near towns, markets, etc. To those who contemplate going to southwest Missouri, will say that Polk, Hickory and Dallas counties offer far better inducements than Vernon county, a great portion of the lands being very much lower. Can buy lots of lands here yet for from five to ten dollars per acre. We had great crops of nearly everything here last year, and living is very cheap; for instance: Dried apples, two cents per lb.; nice white beans, 2c per lb.; sorghum, 20 to 25c per gal.; corn, 20c per bu. I was over to Humansville on the Memphis some time ago and paid A. H. Alexander a visit; he is located on a rich prairie four miles northeast of Humansville. Land is worth in his vicinity \$20 to \$40 per acre. I live 20 miles east, in the timber, but we have lots of nice farms, both upland and bottom. The following from the Fayetteville (Ark.) Republican, in regard to an old resident of this county, may interest some of our readers: "Joseph Rocher was convicted in this county of the charge of selling native wine contrary to law and was fined \$222.50 which he secured by a note made payable January 1st, 1895. The sheriff agreed to permit Rocher to deposit the amount in the bank payable to his order February 1st in execution of judgment. All that Rocher possessed was invested in a vineyard, and under the decision of the supreme court which sustained the legality of the local option law, he was debarred from selling his stock in Washington or any other license county. His grape crop this year will be useless to him. On the strength of these facts and to the further fact of his pleading guilty to the charge, the governor has remitted the fine."
