### NEBRASKA NOT SUFFERING. And No One is Authorized to Collect Aid.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., March 7.—A dispatch from Omaha, Neb., says that reports from the east received there state that persons are soliciting aid in eastern and middle states for Nebraska sufferers. The Omaha dispatch also says that stories of destitution and suffering in Nebraska are not confirmed by investigation by the secretary of the state board of agriculture.

This announcement has created some uneasiness here in consequence of the fact that Rev. H. G. Hawley, claiming to come from the Nebraska Methodist church, left here a day or two ago after collecting more than \$100 from the churches and the Epworth League for Nebraska sufferers. Mr. Hawley stated that it was not necessary to pay the money to him and said the church could send the money to R. B. Snyder of Fremont, Neb., who was authorized to receive it.

The people here are in doubt as to whether his story is true and as to his authority to collect money for the purpose stated.

The above article was printed in a local paper of Erie, Pa., and forwarded to THE CHIEF by Geo. W. Barker. It is the first time that we have heard of suffering in Nebraska this winter. However if the Hawley spoken of in the article above is the G. W. Hawley, formerly of this city, we must believe that he is residing in a part of the country where there is suffering, but there is no such thing in this part of the state. The initials are not the same and therefore we conclude that it must be another man. We do not believe that there is any suffering in the state to speak of, and those who solicit aid from other states do so on their own responsibility.

### Supervisors Proceedings.

RED CLOUD, March 9, 1896.  
Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Minutes read and approved.  
Peters, Pope and Hoffman were appointed to appraise c 1 ne 1/2 16 2 10.

The petition of John Hyland for admission to soldier's home granted. Papers were ordered prepared.

Official bonds were approved as follows: G. Schraer, R D no 22; Chas Lambert, R D No 11; J M Marker, town clerk.

Moved and carried that the county treasurer order Jacob Kindscher to pay \$9 due county on bridge lumber into treasury.

J. S. White appeared before the board and said that he had applied to county attorney several times to bring suit against different parties for personal taxes and that he refused to bring same in the following cases: Bates & Smith Co., R. E. Moore, F. & M Banking Company and L. Baum. The county attorney was instructed to appear before the board and explain.

The petition to construct roads on section 28, 31, town 1, range 10, was granted.

County Attorney B McNeny appeared and said that the county could not bring suit against non residents for taxes.

### AFTERNOON.

The committee appointed to appraise school land, c 1 ne 1/2 16 2 10, reported that they had appraised the land at \$6.50 per acre.

In the matter of the road in Catherine township through the land of Otto Skjelver and Mr. Baudreau, after discussion was referred to committee on roads.

The matter of S. F. Spokesfield's taxes was referred to committee on ways and means.

Board ordered county treasurer to refund Henry Deidrich \$7.70, erroneous taxes on lots 11 and 12, Garber's 2d addition.

The board granted Garfield township \$50 to build bridge.

Yance Sorgesen applied for a reduction of poor farm rent. The committee reported that his bill be cut from \$40 to \$30. The bill was amended so that the reduction would be \$30 if paid today. Carried.

The committee on bridge in Garfield township made majority and minority report. Majority report was adopted.

Supervisor Peters was authorized to put sign up on Guide Rock bridge.

Shirley introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the county attorney be instructed to investigate the amount of fees retained by J. S. White as county treasurer for the year 1894, and if the county attorney finds that the said J. S. White retained fees in excess of the amount allowed him by law, that the county attorney be and is hereby instructed to commence suit to recover amount.

Referred to ways and means committee.

Shirley introduced a resolution to recover from J. S. White amount paid him for deputy hire. Referred to ways and means committee.

Shirley introduced a resolution calling on County Treasurer White for amount of money in the State Bank at the time of its suspension. Referred to committee on ways and means.

Adjourned until Tuesday at 9 a. m. WEDNESDAY.

Committee on ways and means rec-

commended that no action be taken on resolutions in regard to County Treasurer White.

The resolution of Shirley in regard to county money in State bank of Blue Hill was discussed and carried, and county treasurer reported that the amount in the bank at suspension was \$2227 37.

J. P. Eglinton offered the following resolution:

Whereas, a county levy of one mill for a road fund was made in the year 1894, a considerable portion of said levy having been cancelled and the county treasurer pay same back to townships. No action taken.

Adjourned until 1 p. m.
