FARMERS' INSTITUTE WORK

### A Beneficial Gathering on Last Tuesday, at Cowles,

On Last Tuesday, March 10th, the Webster County Farmers' Institute held an adjourned meeting in the Congregational church at Cowles, at which time and place a fair sized crowd was pres

President Alyea called the meeting to order, and Secretary Myers read the Isaac Cowley of Bladen was unavoidably constitution and rules adopted at a previous meeting.

The program was carried out, with one exception.

I. B. Hampton of Guide Rock read a very interesting paper on "alfalfa and marked attention. He produced some fine specimens of alfalfa, which were grown on bottom and up-land. Both were thrifty and had been sown about one year ago. He thought alfalfa could be grown on high land as well as on the bottoms; he would not use press drill, he said, but would sow broadcasthe thought press drill was a disadvantage; he had known it to be winterkilled, but only in instances where gophers had worked in it; if hogs were turned upon it in winter, they should have their noses cut so they could not root, as that also injured the plant; he also believed that sowing too late was injurious; also, sowing over 15 pounds of seed operated against its growth.

He said that Kaffir corn should be planted about the same time as Indian corn. There was no second growth to Kaffir corn; it should be ground to feed. It was a splendid feed, and the fodder was excellent.

Mr. Garret Ohmstede of Guide Rock spoke briefly and to the point on subsoiling. The speaker said that in Germany, his native country, they subsoiled differently, going down seven or eight feet, and doing it with spades; in this country they only went from 18 to 20 inches. He talked a few minutes on irrigation; said that he had put 2000 barrels of water on a quarter of an acre, and sould not tell where the water went to; he used a windmill and a 100 barrel tank. The quarter of an acre was sub-

Harry Hopkins of Cowles had subsoiled a garden spot, but what was very gated and found that a crust seemed to have formed underneath the surface that kept the water from soaking into

going too fast; the time to subsoil was this country in nearly every case. disadvantage. You must not expect results at once, but would get it the following year. The ground that he had subsoiled last season was in fine shape irrigated it plenty; this year, when he was digging post-holes for a garden fence, he could go down easily, but when he stepped sixteen feet distant, it took ail his effort to dig eighteen inches.

The discussion on subsoiling and irrigation was most interesting, and brought out a great many facts that were not generally known.

Mr. Alva Pierce was next on the program and read an excellent article on poultry. He believed that hens were one of the main stays of the farm home; they should be cared for and fed well. His favorite was White Leghoins; he also liked Black Spanish; both were good layers and were splendid for the

C. E. Putnam discussed the hog question in a manner that showed that he had made a careful study of the question; he thought that full blood stock was better than grades; they were hardier and fattened much quicker. His favorite was the Berkshire. Those present took up the subject and discussed it pro and cen, some believing that the Poland China was the best.

Their feed was touched upon and L. H. Rust thought that corn, oats and bran, soaked was the feed; Mr. Putnam thought

that mill feed was the best.

Mr. Ohmstede believed that very little cern and more beets was what a hog needed as food, and, if that was done, there would be less sickness among hogs. He had fed hogs 16 years and had lost but a very small per cent, and received better results than those who fed all corn. I. B.
