Supervisors' Proceedings.

Board met March 9, 1896, pursuant to adjournment. W. B. Baby chairman, L. H. Fort clerk. The following members were present. Peters, Kort, Pope, Hoffman and Ellington. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Peters, Kort and Ellington were appointed to appraise the 6 1/4 ne qr 16-2-10 school land. The prayer of John Highland and wife asking for application in the soldiers home at Grand Island was granted.

The following official bonds were approved: Sheriff Schroes O. H. R. dist. 22. Chas. Lambert O. H. R. dist. 31. J. W. Marker township clerk.

Motion prevailed to notify Jacob Kindscher to pay into the county treasury \$10 for old bridge lumber purchased from M. Watt.

County Treasurer White informed the board that he had urged the county attorney to bring suit against several parties indebted to the county personal taxes. County attorney had refused to do so in the following cases: Bates & Smith Co., R. E. Moore, Farmers & Merchants Bank, and L. Baum. On motion the county attorney was requested to appear before the board and explain matters.

Petition for consent road beginning at the north corner of sec 32 town 1 range 20, west, and running thence east one mile on sec line between sections 28 and 33, town 1, range 20, and terminating at the northeast corner section 33 town 1, range 20 west of the sixth meridian was granted.

Bernard McNeeny county attorney came before the board, and explained why R. E. Moore and others had not been sued for personal taxes due the county. Moore's taxes are taxes due on bank stock, hence the county cannot get a personal judgment against him. The taxes are a lien on the bank stock only, and the bank is now due and the stock is worthless. The same reason is assigned for failing to bring suit against the F. & M. bank; and that L. Baum and Bates & Smith are non residents, and have no personal property in the county.

Board adjourned until 1 p. m. Tuesday, in order to give the committee on appraisal of school land and committee on bridge time to attend their duties.

Board met Tuesday afternoon, with all members present.

Sunday-School Convention.

Only a few more days and Red Cloud will be alive with delegates to the Union Sunday-school convention, which convenes Thursday, March 26, at 2:30 sharp. The different local committees are busy arranging, and will have everything in readiness, so that nothing will mar our pleasure nor sully our glory at the coming Sunday-school feast and banquet.

From the present outlook, we can see no reason why this will not be the largest, the best, the most profitable gathering together of Sabbath-school workers in a union convention ever held in this section. The whole county seems to be aglow, working for the same cause, unfurling the same banner, endeavoring to elevate society, holding themselves in readiness to do their part, waiting for the time to come for the onward march to the convention, when we "Hold the Fort" will become a song of the past, and that we can start out anew with "Onward Christian Soldiers," enlisting in our army every man, woman, and child in the county.

Coming together in convention will educate us for this work, as we can exchange ideas, and profit by each other's experience. Who is there among us that can afford to miss it? In union there is strength.

Most of the schools have sent in their reports, yet some are holding back, I know not why. Of your enrollment, 21 enrolled gives you two delegates, and four officers will make six delegates from small schools. When schools are closed, the last superintendent or assistant can appoint the delegates.

Our program has been out for over a month, and, as far as we have learned, all are prepared and will be here. We do hope all delegates will be here the first afternoon, as that is the foundation, and we want it built strong and solid; besides, some of the most important business of the convention will come up. In the evening we expect one of the grandest rallies services we ever attended. We are assured of good music, for we hear of a number of places they are practicing and preparing. Subjects for essays and discussions are as follows: A Christian Responsibility to Sunday-school Work; What are Sunday-schools for? A Sunday-school Teacher Outside of the Class; The Observance of the Sabbath; Can a Denominational Sunday-school be Benefitted by a Union Sunday-school Association; Temperance and the Sabbath-school; What Advantages are Derived by Grading a Sunday-school; Should Lesson Helps be used in a Class; In Whose Hands is the Destiny of our country; Has Christianity any Remedy for Drouth and Crop Failures. Friday evening the ministers of the county will discuss: "Should Christians take an active part in Politics." We will have a question box at the end of each session; you can prepare your questions and hand them in early.

We want to organize every township in the county; we trust the superintendents and officers will leave no stone unturned. No matter if your school is closed, you can send in a report, appoint your delegates and notify everybody you see. To those outside of Sunday-schools, you are welcome; come and see for yourself
