SIXTY-ONE DELEGATES PRESENT

The County Union Sunday School convention met in the Congregational church with a fine attendance of earnest christian workers, all bent on making the convention one long to be remembered for the great amount of good to be done; the officers in whose charge the convention was placed having left nothing undone on their part to make it a success, nearly all of them being present. To say that the convention was a success from beginning to end would not half tell it. LINCOLN, Neb. April 2, 1896
Professor Erwin Barbour of the Geological department, delivered a lecture in the first Congregational church. He took for his subject, "How the Worlds were Made." The lecture was illustrated by magnificent stereopticon views. Prof. Barbour elucidated the Nebular hypothesis so well that the most unscientific mind might comprehend it. The slides were well chosen to show the different stages of development. The Professor prepared his lecture with a brief sketch of the long strife between science and some religious teachers. In the course of this introduction he declared that there was absolutely no clashing between religion and science. An over crowded house greeted the lecture.

Prof. Barbour continues to receive reports from different parts of the state respecting the phenomenal rise of subterranean waters. If the fact contained in these reports indicate anything, they point to an increase in the rainfall of the state for 1896. The numerous general snows of the month of March are but the beginning of the increase, in precipitation may justly be expected throughout the year. The indications are that this increased rainfall will be general. Reports from Filley, Gage county, show a heavy rain last week. The creeks are higher than they have been for years and the ground is too wet to plow. "Let the precipitation precipitate!" is the verdict of the farmers.

Col. Alvin Pope is responsible for a new species of capital punishment. Mr. Pope's many Red Cloud friends will be glad to learn that his late researches in ancient history have resulted in a discovery hitherto overlooked. Recently, Alvin, in discussing the characteristics of a certain ancient democracy before the class in European history, noted the singular cruelty of the people in executing a man in his absence. Stole a march on him as it were.

Captain Jack Crawford, the poet scout, entertained a large audience at the Y. M. C. A. rooms on Monday evening. Mr. Crawford is the same lively, sparkling personality that appears in his poems and stories. The long well-kept hair that flows down over his shoulders gives him a romantic appearance. It has none of the grimy, greasy appearance usual to the westerner of the Buffalo Bill type. The poet entertained the audience highly by extracts from his writings, and stories of scout life.
