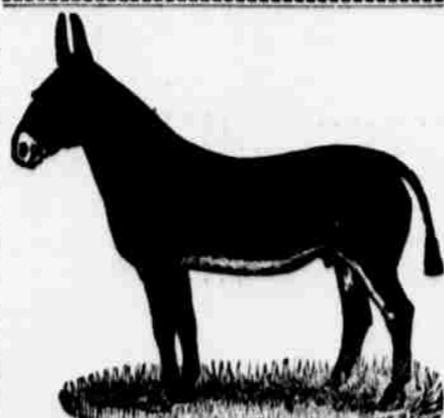
Chas. Ailes, the assessor, has been finding out how much our farmers are worth. Charles is the right man for that place every time.
