### Gold Fields of Gillett District.

GILLETT, Col., April 27, 1896.

Friend Hosmer.—As I have been reading the Great Family Weekly this afternoon it reminded me that I promised you I would let you hear from me occasionally. We are having beautiful weather here now. The roads are dry and dusty and it looks queer to see no vegetation at all growing; the trees are not leaved out and one can see snow in any direction by looking on the mountains, still the roads are dry and dusty. Business is lively here in our little town. There are some fifty houses in construction at the present time and some very good ones. There is a stone store to be started in the morning, 50x70, two story, with brick front. I often wish Ben Ludlow could be here with his brick yard, at \$20 per thousand. There are a number of good mines here the Lincoln, Jack of Diamonds, Cuckoo, and many others. The reduction works, here, handle a great deal of ore, something like fifty cars per day and work fifty men at a shift and they never stop. There is another one building, and will be need for more. There are two or three steam hoists being put in operation in sight of us, besides the many we cannot see. There was a terrible fire at Cripple Creek, Saturday. I suppose you have seen an account of it, but I must tell you a little about it. Mr. Martin and I went over yesterday to see the ruins. It was next to the great Chicago fire. It burned over a space of eleven blocks, all solid building; burned the postoffice and over 25,000 letters. They had to put dynamite under some houses to stop the fire and in one instance there was a man in the house and he was shot up into the air 100 feet. There were a number of lives lost. The estimated loss of property was \$1,000,000 with an insurance of \$225,000. The town is in a horrible condition. Hundreds of people made homeless and penniless, although some were rebuilding. We went around and took dinner with A. L. Funk at the Lincoln hotel, and there we met the smiling face of Port Hedge. He seemed glad to see us and wanted to know if there was enough left in Webster county to go to the state convention. I told him I thought they would have to get some from Kansas to fill vacancies. He looked as natural as every and I think is doing well. I am glad to hear you are having such good rains there and hope old Nebraska will redeem herself this fall. Hoping our delegates to the state convention will do all they can towards securing the nomination for L. P. Albright for state treasurer, I will close hoping he may get the nomination so I can come home and vote for him. I remain as ever,
