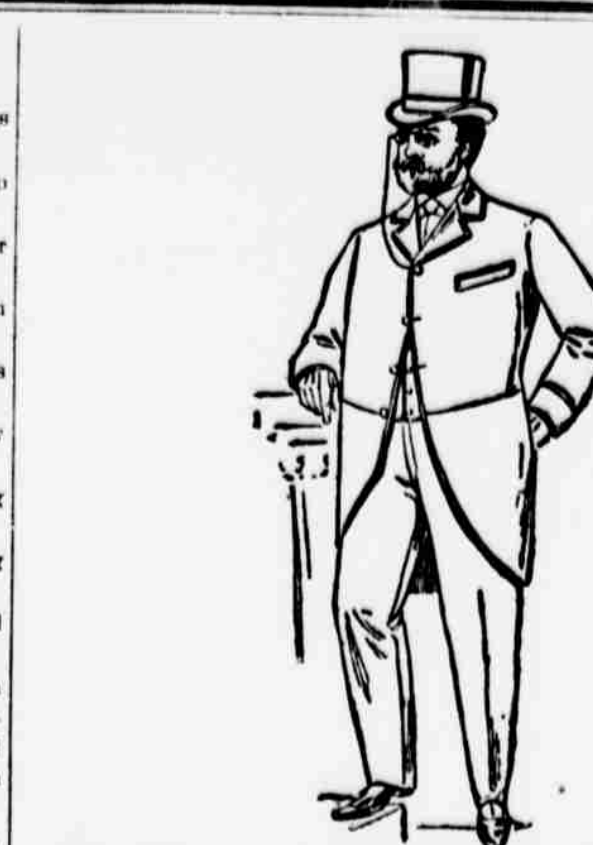
Charley Reigh- was in McCook this week.
