GILLET, May 23, 1896. FRIEND HOSMER:—I see that you are still in Red Cloud by a CHIEF that I received this evening and as I promised to write you occasionally I will tell you of a short trip Mr. Martin and I just took. We started from here yesterday morning for High Park and Gold Springs. We drove over to Cripple Creek then northwest and around Mount Pisga and passing down through the Box Canon, there are some of the finest scenery one ever looked upon, for instance, imagine yourself going through a space just wide for a wagon and a straight wall of rock on each side for 500 feet or nearly as high as one could look. We finely reached High Park which is a beautiful little town with about twelve houses in it, consisting of a hotel, livery stable, two saloons, one store, surveyors office and a few dwellings. It is situated on a slight elevation with pine trees surrounding it. After dinner we made our way on over the hill to Gold Springs, Mr. A. L. Funk's town, there we found as fine a place for a town as one often sees. It is situated at the foot of Ball mountain on a small stream, there we left our horses and went on foot to the mountain and what should we find but a load claim "The Little Emma" staked by Geo. Lindsay, close to a shaft claim that assayed \$1316, so what did we do but go down the gulch and stake a tunnel sight, then came back to High Park and stayed all night and enjoyed our meals and bed especially. This morning we started back; stopped at Cripple Creek, met Frank Tennant, he looks as natural as life; got home about 4 p. m. in a hard snow storm. I presume this will sound strange to you but the trees here have not commenced to leaf out yet. I don't see when they have their summer here but for all that I like it. It is a great place for a person to rustle for a job and there are a great many after every one. Cripple Creek is building up very fast after being burned up twice. Our little town is steadily growing. There have been some very nice developments made close to Gillett, one of \$6000 and some others not so much. There are a number of shaft houses being built within sight of town and the foundation of another large reduction works is done ready for the frame work. A carpenter just signed a contract to build thirty new houses for a Denver party. The electric lights will start this week, the poles are all up and wired. I think we have a beautiful town; it is situated at the foot of Trackit mountain. The streets are lined with trees on either side, with a nice stream of water running down on each side and our roads are as hard as if paved. People get married here for I hear the boys charivaring some one new. Well if I haven't tired you out you can answer this and I will remain, Respectfully, J. C. WARNER.

Crop Reports by States.

ILLINOIS. DeWitt county.—Weather fine and corn planting progressing rapidly. Pastures good. Many farmers are holding their hogs for higher prices.

Mason county.—Good rains. Corn planting progressing. Potato bugs have made their appearance. Wheat somewhat damaged.

Carroll county.—Grass full two weeks ahead of time. Fruit prospects excellent. Corn coming nicely.

Livingston county.—Corn planting is being pushed rapidly. Pasture in splendid condition.

INDIANA. Reports from over the state show that farming is under fair headway. Kaffir corn is being tested this season. Hay is worth \$10 per ton. A large area has been sown to oats. Fruit prospects were never better. Cut worms have made their appearance. Wheat is growing slowly on account of lack of rain.

MICHIGAN. Reports from LaPeer, Sanilac, St Joseph, Tuscola and many other counties show that the cold weather has retarded planting. Fruit bids fair to be an excellent crop. Hay crop promises well. Winter wheat is above the average. Stock of all kinds doing well.

KANSAS. In Smith, Jewell, Phillips, Decatur, Mitchell, Thomas, and all northern and central counties crop are looking fine and a great deal of the corn is up. Heavy rains this season have put the ground in the best shape that it has been in for two or three years. With present condition holding out through the season there will be an immense yield. Chinch bugs doing but little damage. Pasture was never better. Winter cattle going onto grass in fine shape.

OKLAHOMA. Some parts of the territory need rain. Wheat is suffering from chinch bugs. Crops are otherwise looking well.

MISSOURI. Atchison county.—The season is well advanced and corn planting is being pushed. A very large acreage of corn is being put in. Prospects for fruit were never better.

New Madrid county.—Wheat fields are being destroyed by army worms. Timothy meadows have been somewhat injured and corn is being eaten by them, where up.

Polk county.—Excessive rains have delayed corn planting. Wheat promises good. Oats are a good stand. Fruit prospects are splendid.

Nodaway county.—Prospects for crops were never better. Corn, wheat and oats are sure winners this season.

IOWA. Reports from our correspondents over the state announce the farming prospects in good condition for this time of year. Corn, oats, wheat, fruit, &c., in fair condition. Farmers are busy planting corn. Grass is about two weeks ahead of the season.

MINNESOTA. Land is still wet but fruit is growing rapidly. Stock came through the winter in fine shape. Less barley was sown this year than usual. Grain sown previous to the hard rains is looking well. Cows in demand at good prices.

NORTH DAKOTA. But very little seeding has been done so far. More barley will be sown this season than usual. Wheat will not be as large an acreage as usual. Farmers are very busy getting their fields ready for the crops.

WISCONSIN. Farmers feel good this season over their prospects and with the continuance of the present state of weather will raise large crops. Corn will be the principal product this season.
