Pieuro-Paratmonia in England.

We notice the British agricultural papers are remording an outbreak of pleuro-pnessiones among the native cattle in the county of Essex, England. Two cows that and been sick for a long time died, to Dair lungs were sent to the veteriory department of the board of agreement for examination. The examination showed that one had died from the disease above mentioned, and the other from tuberculosis. We are told that the herd in which the former cow was found is to be slaughdisease has been widely spread on account of the long time required for the disease to reach the state shown by the examination.

At the same time the British papers are fighting for a law to prohibit forever the admission of American cattle, except such as are slaughtered at the ports of entry. The reason given for this prohibition is not that the English Cowles last Thursday for country pupils stock growers are to be protected against foreign meats, but that they fear the terrible pleuro-pneumonia that they declare exists in the United

Americans hear nothing of the disease in their own country, where it has been officially pronounced as stamped out. They can therefore only think that the outcry raised in England is for the purpose of getting a protective law under another name.

Cattle Exported Via New Orleans .-This season quite a number of cattle are being sent direct to Liverpool by the way of New Orleans. A steamship recently took over a cargo of 400 beeves in addition to a large amount of other products. Only six beeves died on the voyage. Other steamers are falling into line. The cattle are being supplied argely from Texas.
