An Economical Board.
The board of Supervisors of Webster county are very desirous of displaying the hand of economy when it comes to republican newspapers, but when the pop paper is the bidder that makes a difference, as was shown last week in letting the tax list. The Leader put in a bid for five cents on each description for town lots, and ten cents each for land, which, supposing the list to be worth \$480, would have saved the county \$240. McMillan of the Belt put in a bid for ten cents straight for the work, which would have saved the county about one hundred dollars. In the face of these facts the board let the contract to the Nation for the full price, ten cents for town lots and twenty cents for land. That is economy with a vengeance. The vote stood: Nays; Roby, Peters, Kort, (3); yeas, Hoffman, Pope, Eglington, Shirley (4). What has become of their boasted economy? If it had been a republican board the lowest bidder would have taken the plum, but under the boasted pop order of things economy means economy when republicans are bidding, and when pops bid it doesn't mean anything, take it at your own price and go. Their boasted reform is only skin deep, and hereafter the voters of Webster county will see to it that republicans fill the offices.
