The band refused to play because Mr. Walsh would not pay over the amount he held back from them, and not from any political standpoint whatever. We want the populists to understand that their money is as good as anybody's, and we want them to understand, also, the reason we refused to play for Mr. Walsh. We think enough of Gov. Holcomb to help give him a royal reception, but wish to say that the populist county central committee named above cannot run his bluff on the band any more.

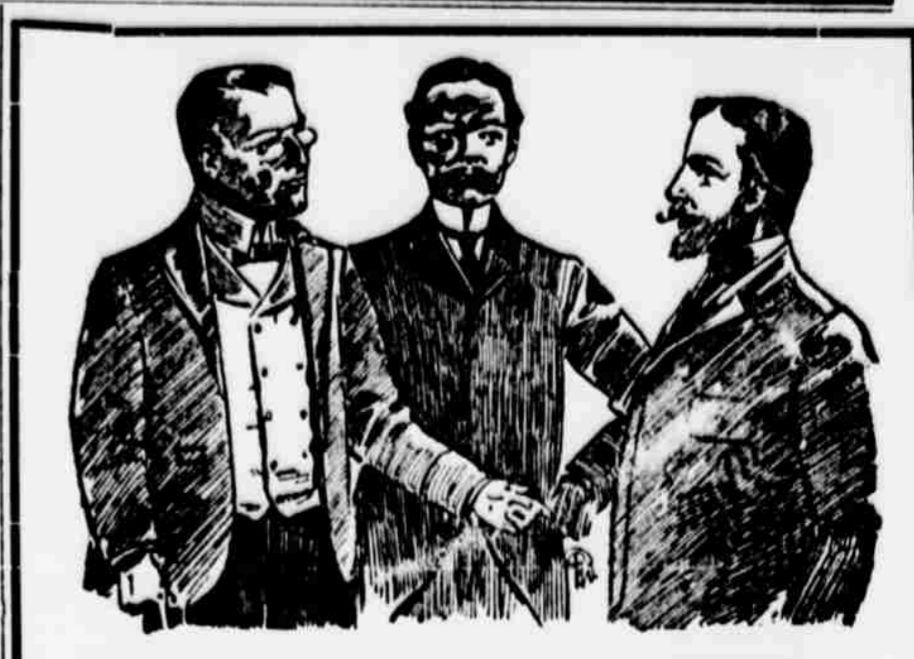
