### WASHINGTON NOTES.

The rainbow chasers have again invaded the Bryan camp, and are making some very tall claims, such as that Iowa will go for Bryan by 37,000, Ohio by 30,000, and New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania by substantial pluralities. Mr. Bryan may be elected—most people in Washington believe that he still has a chance, even if it be not quite as good a chance as Mr. McKinley has—but with the possible exception of Iowa, which is thought to be doubtful although strongly claimed by the McKinley people, he stands no more show of carrying one of these states than he does of carrying Vermont, or than McKinley does of carrying South Carolina. The alleged basis for this new outbreak of the rainbow chasers is a newly discovered undercurrent in favor of silver among the working men. Its real purpose is probably to frighten the McKinley managers into withdrawing some of their forces from the middle west where the presidency will really be won or lost.

Secretary Morton did more to help Bryan than any member of the administration has yet been able to do towards injuring him when he gave out that interview charging the ex-confederate generals with trying to accomplish through free silver what they failed to do by force of arms. It is doubtful if there is a man in Washington, excepting the secretary himself, who does not today condemn both the spirit and the language of that interview. Secretary Morton meant to injure Bryan and free silver, but he has made it certain that thousands of votes in the south will go to Bryan that he would not otherwise have gotten, and he has not alienated any Bryan support in any other section. This is not the first by a number of times that Secretary Morton's tongue has gone off half-cocked, so to speak. While most people have their own opinion as to which policy will be best for the country, there are very few who go so far as to charge their opponents with a desire to destroy the government. In a heated political argument, a man may say many foolish things, but down deep in his heart he knows, whether he be a gold man or a silver man, that his opponent is actuated by precisely the same sentiment as himself—a desire to do what will add to the prosperity and future greatness of the country; and that the only difference between them is one of opinion as to what will accomplish that purpose.

According to Mr. Reese H. Voorhees, son of Senator Voorhees, who has just returned from Indiana, that state is trembling in the balance and will go to Bryan or McKinley just as the labor vote desire it to go. He says that both the republicans and democrats confess privately that they are at sea in regard to the bulk of the labor vote, which both are still making extraordinary efforts to capture. The political managers at Washington believe that there are other states in which the balance of power is held by the labor vote, and in which they have been unable to get any reliable knowledge of how the bulk of that vote will be cast, but they are not talking about them; at least not for publication.

While the positive announcement, which has been made in some newspapers, that an agreement has been reached between the U. S. and Great Britain on the Venezuelan boundary question was a little premature, there is little doubt that the negotiations now under way will soon—probably before the Venezuelan boundary commission reports in favor of the contentions of Venezuelan as there is every reason to believe it will report—result in a satisfactory understanding which can be honorably accepted by Venezuela and the long disputed question of boundary be submitted to arbitration which will settle it once for all.

Once more the rumor is current in Washington that President Cleveland has become tired of the continued failure of Spain to put down the Cuban rebellion and that he has caused a hint to be conveyed to the Spanish government of his intention to recognize the independence of Cuba, if the present status on the Island is maintained for

three months longer. President Cleveland was very near to taking that step last spring, and it is believed would have done so but for political considerations. Such action on his part this winter would be merely participating in the act of his success, as it is pretty well understood that whether McKinley or Bryan be president, the recognition of Cuban independence would not be long delayed after inauguration.

Secretary Carlisle is being criticized even by some who think as he does, for taking advantage of a call made upon him at his office by a Baltimore delegation who wished him to speak in that city, to make an anti-silver partisan in the treasury building. It is speech regarded as a bad precedent.
