moeracy of old intensified with David B. Hill and Arthur P. Gorman and the pension cutters and Tammany Hall all at its back fighting under the flag of 1861, fighting for the proposition that treason and rebellion within a state are not matters for the interference of the federal government. The fact of the matter is that the republican legislature of 1895 figured so carefully in making appropriations that neither Gov. Holcomb nor any other man could properly administer the duties of his office and save a single cent out of the appropriation. There never has been a more efficient legislature than that of 1895 which was republican. The conclusion is that it is the duty of the citizens of Webster county to vote for I. W. Crary, likewise S.
